The magazine, through vol. 2, no. 12, Nov. 23, 1847, was published at Putney. Vol. 2, no. 13, August 5, 1848, was issued at Oneida Reserve, and included a letter to the subscribers explaining that the interval of nine months was due to the fact that the citizens of Putney had held an "indignation meeting" denouncing the publications of the Association as licentious, and requiring an immediate stoppage of the press. Beginning with vol. 3, 1850, the title became "Free Church Circular," which according to the Union List of Serials was in turn superseded by the "Circular," and the "Oneida Circular." For another magazine of a similar nature published at Putney, see below, "The Spiritual Moralist."
