LET'S ALL KEEP HENS

Professor of Oviculture Unburdens Himself of a Barnyard Paean.

SPOKANE, Wasti., Dec. 8 .- (Specfal.)-J. G. Cotton of Okanogan, Wash., who started in the poultry business on a small scale about a year ago with nine hens, has compiled some interest-

The hens began laying in December, and he has kept a close record of the eggs obtained from Feb. 1, 1910, until Nov. 1, 1910, as follows: February 107, March 165, April 203, May 166, June 114, July 125, August 161, September 146, October 108. This is an average of about 192 eggs per hen a year.

Another record which promises to be as remarkable as that of the hens, is for pullets. Eight pullets that were hatched April 11, 1910, began faying Aug. 15, and during that morth faid 29 eggs. In September they laid 196 eggs, and in October 178 eggs.

HEALTH OF SCHOOL CHILDREN Results of Medical Staff's Work for

York

Some interesting figures are given out in the report of the medical inspectors of the public schools for November. Dr. Wilmot A. Graham visited twenty-five schools and examined 360 pupils. Among 316 pupils he found 382 defects, 153 of which were referred to the family physician. They were as follows: Defective breathing, 112; enlarged tonsils, 61; adenoids, 22; nasal obstruction, 8; defective vision, 32; defective hearing, 15; skin disease, 23; other defects, 19. One pupil was excluded on account of contagious disease.

other defects. 19. One pupil was excluded on account of contagious discase.

Dr. Helen MacMurchy examined 21.7 pupils and sent 117 cards to parents of defective children; 221 defects were found altogether, and listed as follows: Throat affections, 58; defective vision, 47; defective hearing, 22; detective breathing, 46; skin troubles, 22; orthopedic defects, 5; enlarged glands, 6; backward children, 7; defective heart, 4; anaemia, 4. Accidents kept three children from school; genera; reasons for absence detained 9; 12 children suffered from 2 defects.

Lina L. Rogers, superintendent of school nurses, sent in the following report: Total inspections, 11,274; treatments given, 232; sight defective, 159; hearing defective, 29; skin troubles, 81; pediculosos, 325; defective breathing, 38; enlarged glands, 18; enlarged gottomis, 52; carious teeth, 2027; miscellaneous cases, 38; referred to medical inspectors, 1038; visits to homes, 215; visits to schools, 166; miscellaneous visits, 16; exclusions, 18; glasses fitted, 11; tonsils removed, 17; teeth filled, 30.
