## LIVE STOCK MARKET

With receipts of 4053 cattle on the Union Stock Yards market yesterday and a strong and insistent demand for the better class of butcher steers and heifers, the market for this class of cattle was decidedly strong.

For cattle weighing from 1050 lbs. and upwards the market was probably from 10¢ to 25¢ per cwt. higher. Light weight cattle, weighing less than 1050 lbs., sold at probably from 10¢ to 25¢ lower. There was a wider range between the light weight cattle and the good cattle, and the greater percentage of the offerings on the exchange yesterday were of the lighter weight grade.

The demand for butcher cows was very strong and the bull market was steady. There was a strong inquiry for breeder stockers and feeders and with not many of this class of cattle on sale.

Good quality milkers and springers, especially if the latter were well bred, were in good demand at steady to firm prices with last week.

The market for heavy yearlings, the cattle held over in the hope of better trading. Taken all round, the market was good and steady at last week's prices.
