### HARDY TALKS IN EAST YORK

After the Liberals Picked Out  
Mr. Richardson

AS THEIR CANDIDATE AGAIN

Ontario Premier Denies That There are Two Factions in His Cabinet.

Mr. Davis Explains About That Fugitive Piggy—Mr. Hardy Says the Public Will Have Full Warning of the Election—Tarte Will Have No Hand in It Either—No Thanks Tarte is an Honest Politician.

At the Liberal convention in East York, held at the Markham Town Hall yesterday afternoon, Mr. John Richardson, M.L.A., was chosen to carry the Reform standard in the pending provincial elections. Additional interest was lent to an after-gathering by the presence of Premier Hardy and Hon. E. J. Davis, who, though they did not make any startling announcements, spoke vigorously and at some length. The Premier was at much pains to reply to statements appearing in these columns.

At the convention, which opened at 2.30, Mr. J. Lee, president of the Reform Association, occupied the chair, being supported on the platform by John Richardson, M.L.A., H. Johnston, Geo. Flint, R. J. Gibson, H. R. Frankland, F. K. Reesor, H. P. Crosby, W. D. Reesor, D. B. Nighswander, D. H. Hoover, F. R. Reesor, proposed by E. H. Wilson, seconded by J. P. McMahon, H. R. Frankland, proposed by H. P. Crosby, seconded by J. C. Clark, seconded by W. S. Ormiston, George Flint, proposed by R. H. Johnson, seconded by John Richardson, David James, proposed by L. The nominees were all allowed a short time to address the convention. Mr. Flint asked who Mr. Whitney and his party were, Mr. Hoover warned his hearers that the Ontario Government would have to bear such an onslaught at the next election as had never yet been made.

Mr. H. R. Frankland, referring to the last Dominion election, called upon those present to support their votes the sting placed on their candidate by a judge a short time before.

Mr. R. J. Gibson had been credited with a desire to dispute Mr. Richardson's right to the nomination, but he said he came to the convention when it did come he would not retire for Mr. Richardson or anyone else.

Mr. Richardson, M.L.A., talked until the chairman advised him to abbreviate his remarks, as Premier Hardy was to have the floor. Mr. Richardson, however, delivered a pack of rascals, who had piled up the national debt and robbed the treasury. The rest of his address consisted of praise for the Ontario Government.

Mr. Richardson was then formally accorded the nomination, all the other nominees having retired.

Mr. G. B. Smith, the former representative of the riding, spoke briefly, and was followed by Provincial Secretary Davis, who complimented his hearers on having come so near winning East York for the Dominion House at the last election, and went on to praise their stand-bearer in the pending provincial fight. After speaking of the ability of others whose names had been mentioned in connection with Liberal honors, the speaker briefly reviewed Mr. Richardson's record in municipal and county politics and pointed out his fitness for the task imposed upon him.

### SUDDEN DEATH OF AN ENGINEER.

Mr. James Allan, Grand Trunk Engineer,  
succumbs to Heart Disease.

Mr. James Allan of 20 Sullivan-street,  
a locomotive engineer, employed by the  
Grand Trunk Railway Co., died suddenl  
at noon yesterday. Whilst waiting  
on Queen-street west he was seized with  
severe pain in the region of the heart,  
and turned off the busy street into Dea  
son-avenue. He stopped at a door and  
asked for a seat and a drink of water.  
By the time the lady returned with the  
glass of water Mr. Allan had expired.  
Coroner Spencer was promptly summon  
ed, and decided that no inquest was  
necessary, as deceased had recently com  
pleted a statement of the facts.

Mr. Allan was 40 years of age, and  
had been in the service of the Grand  
Trunk Railway for 22 years. He was a  
trusted servant, and most highly re  
spected. He was a member of Occident  
Club, A.P. and A.M., and of the Lo  
comotive Brotherhood of Firemen and  
Drivers.

At the time of the seizure he had not  
been 20 minutes away from home, and  
had gone out for a walk. The funeral  
will be held, conducted by Miss Carson  
of New York.
