Program of Dominion and Leyland Lines for Coming Season.

TRANSFER OF THE I. C. R.

To the C.P.R. Discussed By Toronto Manufacturers Yesterday Afternoon.

CAME TO NO DEFINITE DECISION

Talked About Rates on the White Pass Railway and the Settling of Shippers' Claims.

At a meeting yesterday afternoon of the Railway and Transportation Committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, which was presided over by Archibald Campbell, the proposal of the Halifax Board of Trade, that the Intercolonial Railway be handed over to the Canadian Pacific Railway was discussed at some length. The meeting came to no definite decision, but it was the general feeling that the transfer should not be made. It was considered that the resolution of the Halifax Board of Trade might not have been properly understood. A letter, accompanying the resolution, stated that the latter had been passed and sent out so that the matter might be thoroughly discussed, bringing out possibly some plans as to the future of the road. The letter did not look favorably on the present conditions of management of the I.C.R. and the submitted resolution was to the effect that the management of it be given over to the C.P.R., but that it should continue to be a government railway. The committee will report to the Executive Council on the question. The excessive rates in effect on the White Pass Railway were also discussed. The Minister of Railways will be asked to remedy the trouble. It was decided to go direct to the railway authorities and try, if possible, to secure a faster settlement of shippers' claims.

WILL WAIT ON THE PREMIER.

To Urge Establishment of Permanent Exhibition in London.

The promise made at a recent dinner by Premier Ross, that the government would grant \$5000 towards the establishment in London of a sample room for Canadian manufacturers was taken up at a meeting yesterday afternoon of the Board of Trade Council. A committee was appointed to wait on the Premier in regard to the matter.

Montreal, Feb. 11.—The funeral of the late Mr. Charles Nelson, who had died at St. Paul, Minn., took place to-day on the arrival of the 800 train. The remains had been accompanied from St. Paul to Montreal by Mr. Nelson's son, and it was in accordance with the expressed wish of the late Mr. Nelson to be buried under the British flag that the remains were brought to Montreal for interment. There were quite a number present, and the friends of the deceased gentleman followed to Mount Royal Cemetery. The late Mr. Charles Nelson was the youngest son of the late Dr. Wolfrid Nelson, whose name is closely associated with the battle of St. Denis and it was at this place that Mr. Charles Nelson was born just a year previous to the memorable rebellion.

APPLAUSE IN COURT ROOM.

Celebrated Case of Marie Roy Dismissed in Montreal.

Montreal, Feb. 11.—Judge Choquet this morning gave judgment in the celebrated case of Marie Roy, charged with the theft of various articles of jewelry and vest, some \$100 in number, from R. A. Dickson, jeweler. His Honor dismissed the case, after a very able review of the evidence, and the judgment was received with applause by the crowded courtroom. Judge Choquet this morning said the case was one of the most difficult that had come before him, owing to its being very badly handled from the beginning. There was no fault on the part of the Crown, but the prosecutors had got mixed up in their case out of such materials as were got previous to the charge.

Detroit Mich., Feb. 11.—President Piquet of the wrecked City Savings Bank said to-day that he believed the cheque amounting to \$382,000, which the Cashier H. R. Andrews certified for F. C. In this event he thought the depositors would receive at least 75 cents on the dollar. F. C. 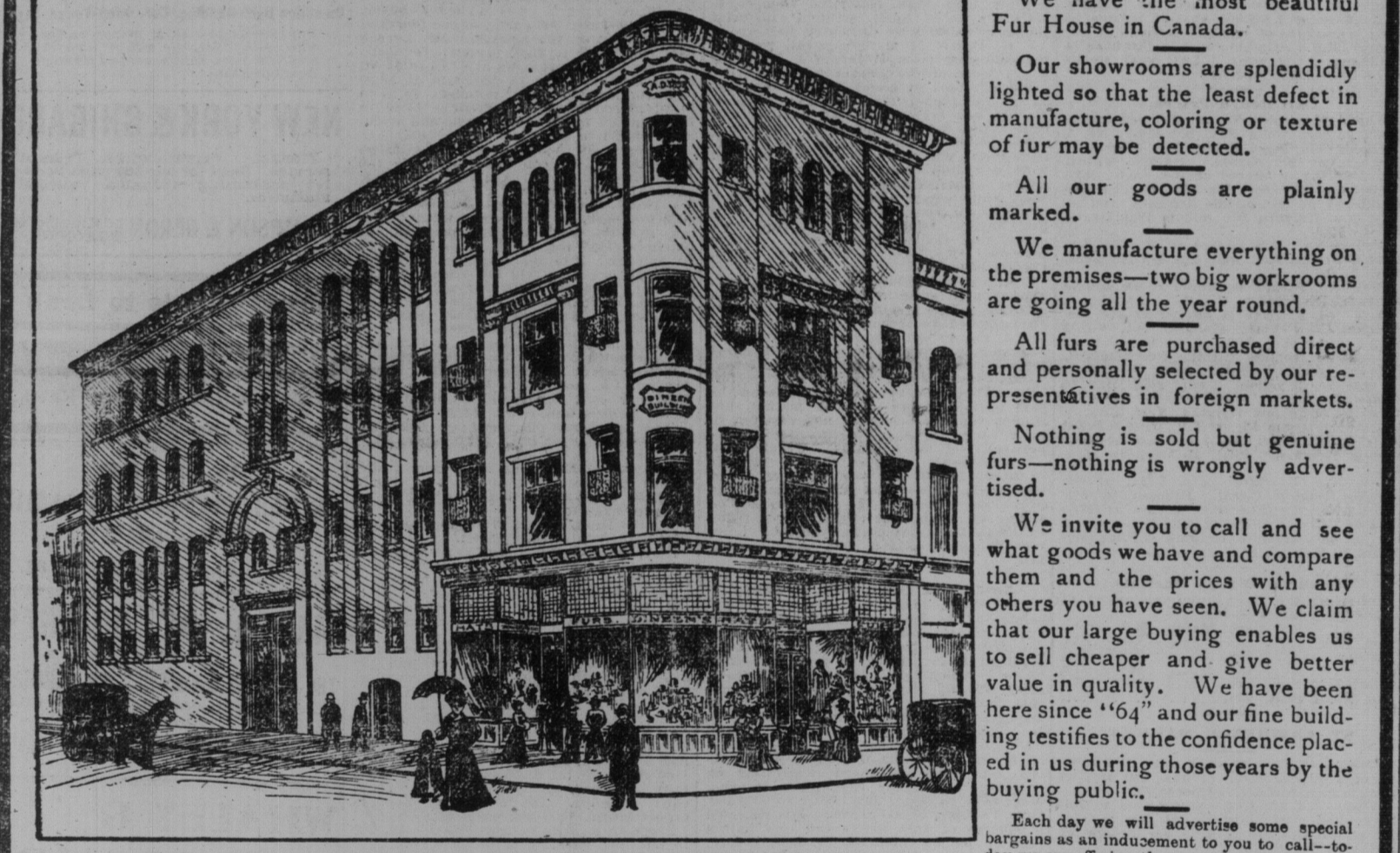
