



YUKON CONCESSION DEBATED,
Motion for Bringing Down Correspondence Was Carried.

Ottawa, April 4—The Treadgold concession was debated in the Senate yesterday. The subject was brought up by Senator Macdonald of Victoria, B.C., on a motion for the correspondence. He alluded to the sweeping character of the concession and the injustice it worked to the ordinary miner.
