This the Fateful Day for Sault Ste Marie Clergie Arranges to Pay Speyer Mortgage

Five Hundred Hungry Men Walk Streets While Citizens Go to Church.

ONTARIO GOVERNMENT IS AIDING Impression Grows That Napoleon of the North Will Come to His Own Again.

Sault Ste. Marie, Sept. 27.—(Special).—Today the city has presented the gloomiest picture since the collapse. A telegram from Francis Clergie to Supt. Lewis of the steel plant, declaring that he had arranged to pay off the Speyer mortgage and wanted the works resumed Oct. 8, did not dispel the dismal feeling that has gripped the city and local conditions inspire.

Printed tickets calling for a single meal not to cost more than 25c, were distributed in small numbers yesterday after Mayor Plummer had said some very warm things to Manager Coyne. Scarcely would a hungry man fish one meal called for by these tickets signed by the company, before he was out skrimishing for more.

That Fed in Essex County. Another Cow Poisoned and Constable Fears Murder Will Come. Windsor, Sept. 27.—Another cow belonging to Farmer James W. Hawkins in Sandwich Township was taken suddenly ill with some convulsions about a week ago, and Constable Vanderinder says the animal was poisoned by green. He claims it is only another chapter in the Hawkins-St. Louis feud which has been raging for two years.

Rain Causes Suffering. A cold rain all night, continuing today, contributed to the misery of the city. Hundreds flocked to the cheerless car barns last night for shelter. This morning they presented a pitiful appearance. Adjacent families slept in many places of bread, and the men sat around smoking pipes, waiting for their bread to be baked.

Better Place to Sleep. "We do not get any money when we break in," he continued, "but we will at least have better place to sleep than in an open barn without fire or straw."

TARTE ON SIFTON. Says He Is In League With American Railways to Hurt Canada.

Montreal, Sept. 27.—"Mr. Sifton," said Hon. J. Israel Tarte at a Conservative gathering at Joliette on Saturday afternoon, "has his covet eyes on the American railways, and he is in league with the American roads. They want Canadian trade to go by American channels to American ports. They want American goods to go by American roads, via Chicago, Duluth and other lake ports of the United States. I have never been the companion and confidant of James J. Hill. I was of my country and of my province. Let me tell the Liberals what I served faithfully during the six years I was a minister, that influences are at work here that you cannot see, but which exist, influence that three years ago would have been powerless. THREE MEN DROWNED. Sank in a Wagon and Did Not Reappear. Guelph, N.W.T., Sept. 27.—Three men were drowned in the Bow River on the Blackfoot reserve last night. Messrs. Sergt. Brooks, J. Disbury and one of the crew of the tugboat "The Galia" were sent down while crossing the river and did not reappear. A few fish were recovered from the wreckage.

SCRATCHED WRIST IN DUEL. Paris, Sept. 27.—A duel with swords has been fought in the grounds of a country club near Paris, between Count Arcois de Clavijo and the Marquis of Arguda. The latter was thrice wounded on the wrist and the forearm.

HAGUE ARBITRATION COURT. The Hague, Sept. 27.—The Venetian Arbitration Court, consisting of Count Muraviev, Prof. Lammarsh and Prof. de Martens will begin its work on Oct. 1. The official language used before the tribunal will be English.
