JESUS THE TEACHER

Interesting Discourse by Rev. W. H. A. Claris at the Southern Congregational Church.

Following is a brief synopsis of Rev. Mr. Claris' discourse, given last evening, from the text, "And beginning at Moses and all the prophets, he ex-

the things concerning himself. (Luke, xxiv., 27.) Here we have the example of Jesus, the teacher sent from Goa, in dealing with sad and bewildered men. Two disciples were on their way to Emmaus, on the morning of the resurrection of Jesus from the tomb. They had been disappointed in their expectations concerning their Master; they had hoped to have seen him proclaim himself king, and by help from heaven to have enforced his claims; but instead they have seen him betrayed and crucified. Their minds must have been full of recollections of all the wonderful things that he had said and done in their midst since his appearance among them, and all that they had witnessed during the last few days, together with the strange reports that had just come to them since the morning had dawned upon them. These hopes had been frustrated, their minds confused, and their hearts filled with sadness when the Saviour joined them, and by one or two simple questions he drew from them their own description of the situation. This he did while "their eyes

were holden that they should not know Now, notice what divine wisdom and skill he here manifests; bringing home to them their great folly, and want of understanding, he leads them away to the source of all light, and comfort. Notice, in our lives we often find ourselves as followers of Jesus in situations where everything seems to be wrong and contradictory to our hopes, to God's promises, and to what we think should be, and it may faith is threatened, and out minds bewildered. And we see where others have been foolish and done wrong, and where God's dealings seem so altogether different from what they should be, while the real difficulty all lies in our want of understanding and trusting

We need communion with our Master; we need his reproofs, his corrections and instruction. Nothing else will

ever bring light and comfort.

Again, notice how Jesus deals with them in their perplexity. He does not speak to them of their lack of reason and intelligence, but he takes them to the Scriptures, to Moses, and the prophets, and all Scriptures, which are so much despised by many would-be teachers of the present day. He seems neither to have questioned Moses, to have corrected the prophets, or to have corrected all the Scriptures; but he confounded all the Scriptures; but he expounds them as if they were all good and safe authority. He finds in them all a purpose and an intelligent reference to himself; and thus he makes their hearts burn within them, and soon their eyes are opened to know better, and they are no doubt greatly relieved and comforted; and are ready to go forth and trust God while they faithfully work to correct wrong, both in themselves, and in the world at large.
