Order To Discontinue Recruiting May Have Effect of Transferring Unit.

More than one thousand men have been recruited in this district by Major Cameron and the members of his staff since February, 1916, for the 63rd and 55th Batteries of Canadian Field Artillery, recruiting for which has been discontinued, according to instructions received on Saturday from Ottawa. Of this number 775 have been secured by the 63rd Battery since April, 1916.

Response Came Early. When the 29th Battery left for over-seas service on February 23, 1916, Major Cameron, then acting officer in com-mand of the 55th Battery, began recruitng for the 55th, and such success did he men who were on his recruiting staff the men who were on his recruiting starf have that 200 men were recruited in 10 days, and before April 1, 1916, 234 men had been secured for the 55th. Of these, 100 left as a draft under Lieut. Morphy, and the remainder left as a complete battery, under Lieut.-Col. Lewis, accompanied by Lieuts. Mathewson and Mitchell, on May 31.

In the meantime, the formation of the 63rd Battery was authorized, and recruiting was started on April 1, 1916. The first man to enlist was given the serial number 333801, and the last man who reported on Saturday was given the number 334515, showing that 714 men have joined in that time. In addition to this number, a detachment of about 25 men was given to the 55th Battery previous to their departure for overseas service, and there are still about 35 men who have joined the battery, but who, owing to business obligations, or for one cause and another, have not been required to report for duty. When these are added to the 714 men shown on the serial numbers, the 775 Men in the 63rd men shown on the serial numbers, the total of about 775 men stands to the credit of the 63rd Battery. 
