### CHICAGO'S UNDERGROUND RAILWAY FORTY-FIVE MILES OF TUNNEL

Chicago, Aug. 14.—The freight bores of the Illinois Tunnel Company will carry merchandise of all kinds in carload lots for the first time tomorrow. Announcement to this effect was made by officials of the company yesterday. This movement will mark the practical completion of the Illinois Tunnel Company's system of underground freight railroads, the construction of which was begun five years ago, and which has cost its owners about

The company now has 45 miles of tunnel equipped with rails and overhead trolley in the district bounded by Chicago avenue, the lake, Halstead street and Sixteenth street. Fifty electrical locomotives and several hundred cars are now ready for use, and the company recently placed an order for

500 additional cars and 35 new locomotives. The company has finished connections with 30 buildings in the downtown district. Cornections have already been made between the freight and warehouses of nine of the principal railroads. Others are under way.

### Electric Smelting a Go; Big Plant for Dominion

### New York, Aug. 14.—A special cable Canadian Experimenters Prove Its Worth and Pitts burg Firm Will Establish On This Side.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Ottawa,. Ont., August. 14,-The investigations of Canada into the comnercial possibilities of electric smelting of iron ore, which were published by Dr. Haanel some time ago, are bearing fruit. It is understood that a big steel firm of Pittsburg is preparing to put up a huge electric smelting plant at some point in Canada where water power and ore are available. In the United States and in Mexico electric smelting plants are to be put up. Six months from now an electric smelting plant, caapable of turning out twenty tons of pig a day, will be in operation in California. It is being installed by Dr. Herault, of France, who erected the experimental station at Sault Ste. Marie, under arrangement with Dr. Haanel, The California plant is to be eventually enlarged to an output of six to eight hundred tons a day.
