

HAMONIC MAY REACH SARNIA AT MIDNIGHT

Went Aground Near Harbor
Beach During Dense Fog
Yesterday.

CARRIED 360 PASSENGERS

Many Alarmist Stories Cur-
rent At Border Points
Last Night.

SARNIA, July 7.—With passengers aboard from Toronto, and many places in Western Ontario, as well as many from various parts of the United States, it was reported late this afternoon that during dense fog, the steamer Harmonic of the Northern Navigation Company, went aground on a reef five miles north of Harbor Beach this afternoon. Two hundred and fifty passengers were aboard at the time, but no loss of life or serious damage to the steamer resulted from the grounding.

Rush Tugs to Scene.
A message from Captain Wing of the grounded steamer to officials of the Northern Navigation Company here stated that he thought it would be possible for the boat to be launched without any assistance. The tugs, Manistique and Columbia from this port, and the coast guard from Harbor Beach have gone to his assistance.

Many wild rumors were current of the Harmonic being in a sinking condition, but a wireless report from the boat, received at the Northern Navigation headquarters tonight, stated that the boat would likely dock here about midnight, as she had been moved off the sand ledge, and that there was absolutely no truth in any reports that were in circulation to the contrary.

HELP FROM DETROIT.
WINDSOR, July 7.—Coast guards and tugs left Detroit late this afternoon to go to the rescue of the steamer Harmonic of the Northern Navigation Company, which with 360 passengers aboard, went aground this afternoon seven miles from Harbor Beach, with fair weather and light winds prevailing.

No anxiety for the safety of the passengers and crew was entertained until shortly after the rescuers left, when dark cloud banks on the western horizon were taken as an evil omen. The ship was bound down the Lakes to Detroit from Duluth.

DETROIT PASSENGERS.
The Harmonic went aground in a dense fog that prevailed over the lakes, and first reports were that she had collided with a downbound freighter. No attempts have been made so far, as is shown by wireless messages, to disembark the passengers.

Two-thirds of the passengers, it was stated at the offices of the Northern Navigation Company, Detroit, were from that city. The vessel is stranded at a point near Woods and Spares settlement, but no names were available owing to the fact that the list is in possession of the purser on board. The Harmonic is a boat of 5,625 tons; length, 329 feet, 50-foot beam, and 23-foot depth. She was built in Collingwood in 1909. The headquarters of the owners are in Sarnia.

RECORD ATTENDANCE AT LIBERAL RALLY IS EXPECTED TODAY

La Pointe, McCoig, Graham
and Kennedy To Address
Monster Assembly.

CAMPAIGN WILL OPEN

Essex Liberals Lead in Pre-
paration For Early Fed-
eral Election.

WINDSOR, July 7.—Liberal forces in Essex County are preparing to campaign in early anticipation of a federal election. Delegates and members from the rank and file of Liberalism throughout the county are expected to gather in a record crowd at Stony Point tomorrow, when a special train, which will leave Windsor at noon, and include in its route all important centres in the county, will convey the big crowd expected.

Prominent among speakers will be W. C. Kennedy, M.P., for North Essex; Hon. George P. Graham, Liberal candidate for South Essex, and former member of the Laurier Cabinet, and Ernest LaPointe, K.C., M.P., for Quebec. Arrangements were finally completed tonight for the big rally at Stony Point, at which it is expected fully 2,000 people will attend. Archie McCoig, K.P., Chatham, today accepted an invitation to be one of the principal speakers at the convention.

WILL NOT RESIGN NOR SERVE UNDER HARTLEY DEWART

J. W. Curry, K.C., M.P.P., De-
clares in Interview At
Windsor.

WINDSOR, July 7.—Retreating his refusal to longer sit in the Provincial Legislature at Toronto under the leadership of Hartley Dewart and giving emphatic denial to reports that he would resign following the demands by members of the Liberal executive in the Queen City, J. W. Curry, K.C., M.P., for Southeast Toronto, who is in the city in connection with a case in progress in the Windsor police court, said today, he would sit in Parliament next session under the guidance of Major J. C. Tolmie, M.L.A., for North Essex.

Not Under Dewart.
"All I can say in regard to the situation of the Liberal party in Ontario at the present time is that I have no intention of resigning and neither have I any intention of doing anything else than sticking in the House as a Liberal, but I will not serve any longer under the leadership of Mr. Dewart," Curry declared.

"I will be there next session, but I will be among a group of Liberals who will sit independently under the leadership of Major Tolmie, your local member."

Efforts to secure an official statement from Major Tolmie regarding the threatened split have proved futile. He is thought to be summing at Southampton, but could not be located there.

INGERSOLL DISSATISFIED AT HYDRO MINIMUM RATE

Action of Provincial Commission Aligned to Benefit the Big Users.

INGERSOLL, July 7.—Some dissatisfaction is being expressed locally in connection with the minimum rate of 75 cents recently fixed for Ingersoll by the Provincial Hydro-Electric Commission. The rate went into effect for the first time with the issuance of bills due the present month. Formerly there were many users of power who had a minimum bill below 75 cents. Rates for Ingersoll were recently reduced, and

the big power consumers have benefited especially; while smaller ones in many instances because of the charge in the minimum charge are having increased bills. The local commission has passed a resolution that Superintendent Hall take the matter up with the provincial commission.

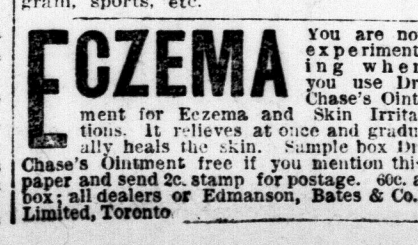


CHATHAM TO CELEBRATE 25TH BIRTHDAY AS CITY

CHATHAM, July 7.—Plans for a monster celebration in this city were laid for civic holiday, Thursday, August 5, when this city will celebrate its 25th birthday. BRANTFORD, July 7.—The Six Nations Indian chiefs propose to take the matter of the new franchise bill to the supreme court and lay the status of the Indian before the supreme justices. The chiefs held a conclave at Onawakeen on Tuesday, when protests were registered. The question of compulsory education does not affect the Brant Indians, as that is already in force on the reserve.

TO HOLD PLEBISCITE ON TESCHEN QUESTION

PARIS, July 7.—The council of ambassadors has notified the Polish and Czechoslovak delegations that since no agreement has been reached by them to arbitrate the Teschen question, a plebiscite in that region will be held.

LIQUOR TIED IN SACKS; SAFETY FIRST SCHEME?

WINDSOR, July 7.—Edgar H. Kellon, riverfront resident, is charged with holding liquor for illegal sale. Provincial License Inspectors Corson and Sykes visited the Kellon home re-

cently, following the arrival of 25 cases of whiskey via express, and found 20 cases and some odd bottle tied up in sacks.

The defense claimed the liquor had been handled in this manner for purposes of concealment in case of attempted theft. Magistrate Miers reserved decision.
