Receipts of live stock at the City Cattle
Market were 84 car loads, composed of 818 cattle, 2602 hogs, 819 sheep and lambs and 36 calves, also 9 car loads of Chicago cattle.

The quality of fat cattle was not good, generally speaking. There were few finished cattle on the market.

There was a good demand for good cattle, but common to medium classes were slow of sale. Drovers were complaining of having to sell for less money than they paid in the country.

Exporters.

There were no straight loads of shipping cattle offered. A few lots picked from loads of butchers' cattle sold at \$4.25 to \$4.00; export bulls were slow of sale at \$3 to \$5.50 per cwt.

Muchaers.

There were few good butchers' cattle offered. The best sold at \$4 to \$4.15 per cwt, and few brought these prices, Medium to good sold at \$3.50 to \$3.30; common, \$3 to \$3.50; inferior, \$2.50 to \$3.

There were few feeders or stockers offered and prices were unchanged, One load of 900-lb. feeders sold at \$3.50 per cwt.

Milch Cows.

Veal Calves.

About 40 veal calves sold at firm prices; good to cholce, \$5 to \$6 per cwt, and medium to common at \$3.50 to \$4.50 per cwt.


