JAMES BAY RAILWAY AIMS TO ADD TO AND TO EXTEND

Mr. Watson of Parry Sound Presents a Petition Asking for Many Changes, Even in Name.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—(Special.)—Mr. Watson of Parry Sound presented in the house to-day the petition of the James Bay Railway Company of Toronto for legislative authority to change its name, and empowering it to lease, purchase or otherwise acquire the lines of the Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia Railway Company, also to extend and define the powers of the company with respect to the issue of bonds, debentures and other securities, and for power to construct the lines of railway below mentioned, also empowering the company to lease to the Canadian Northern Railway Company its lines, or leased lines, or any of them, and to give that company running powers over them.
