

To the late Sir Michael Foster we owe a debt of gratitude for his many accomplish-ments towards the Iris family. The gfter new species was his great hobby. This variety can be grown in a green-house during the winter months. Flor-ists who grow especially for cut flow-ers plant some thousands of these bulbous Iris every fall. When Easter comes round the blooms are very ac-ceptable and command a good price. They can also be grown in pots and started like other bulbs, and a few pots of Iris in distinct colors gives the sunone would wonder wherever the roots penetrate to obtain moisture.
