

# MONTREAL POWER VERY ACTIVE AS MARKET OPENS

## 2,375 SHARES DISPOSED OF THIS MORNING

Prices Are Firm, With Gains  
Made in Several  
Issues

IMPROVEMENTS ARE  
MIXED IN WALL ST.

Motors and Rails Yield Fractionally; Standard Industrials Tend Higher

MONTREAL, Sept. 7.—A turnover of 2,375 shares of Montreal Power, featured the early trading of the local market this morning, after the three day holiday. The price was up three-quarters at the opening, easing off a fraction. Power preferred was dealt in to the extent of 985 shares, unchanged.

Generally the market was firm and active. Brazilian eased from 116 1/2 to 115 1/2, later strengthening in a turnover of 450 shares, and Laurentide a half point to 101. Gains were made in Winnipeg Rails, up one-eighth at 88; Asbestos up a half at 20 1/2; Breweries up a half at 75; Antill up a quarter at 84; and Steamships up a quarter at 87 1/2. Alcohol was traded in to the extent of 940 shares, unchanged at 21.

NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—Resumption of business after the three day holiday in the stock market was accompanied by mixed price improvements. Most of the rails and motors yielding fractionally on initial sales, but the standard industrials tended higher. Allis Chalmers and Postum Cereal each opened a point higher, and United States Steel and American Can improved fractionally.

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## JUDGES BUSY MAKING AWARDS AT EXHIBITION

Rainy Morning Makes Concentration of Activities in Buildings

PRIZE WINNERS AT THE FLOWER SHOW

Wheat Shown Wins High Praise of Visiting Officials

Rainfall outside calling a halt to cattle judging and other outdoor activities at the Saint John Exhibition this morning contrasted strongly with the busy atmosphere inside, where judging of grain, vegetables, women's work, dogs, poultry and other departments proceeded apace. A record was set by Professor Blair of Sackville in the plant exhibit, when on his arrival here last evening he set to work, completing his task late last night.

This morning, S. J. Moore, Truro, of the seed department of the Federal Department of Agriculture, assisted by Lloyd Black, one of the inspectors from Amherst, started on grains. To a Times-Star reporter Mr. Moore said that in his extended experience he had seldom seen such splendid examples of wheat as was on exhibition this year.

Judging of apples was completed yesterday. Some excellent varieties were shown. The apples were judged by G. H. Vroom. Judging in the women's department also is well under way. Miss Pauline Baird is the judge. Results from this section are expected about Thursday.

Tuesday of Exhibition Week usually is a slack day, and Manager Porter and his associates viewed the rain today without comment. Toward noon it cleared and a start was made in judging cattle.

In the dance hall last night a large number attended. The music was excellent.

**FLOWER SHOW JUDGING**

Mr. Blair arrived last evening and immediately set to work judging, completing his work late last evening and leaving on the Digby boat this morning. Letteney, Saint John, also did well, getting \$24 Mrs. G. A. Stubbs, about \$20, and Mrs. F. V. Hamm, Fairville, \$15. Mrs. G. A.
