HON. N. W. ROWELL ON RECONSTRUCTION

Hopes For League of Nations—Expects Labor Ministry in England in Few Years—Changes in Canada

In an address this week, Hon. N. W. Rowell dealt with the problem of reconstruction in a general way. A report of one portion of his speech says: It had been the hope of democratic nations that a League of Nations would be formed as the result of the peace conference. In such a league Canada could join with full heart, and all lovers of democracy and peace would unite in the hope that such a league shall be formed to insure the peace of the world. He hoped that as a first contribution to that peace the Kaiser and his son would be imprisoned on some modern St. Helena there to remain as object lessons of the fate awaiting a man who placed his personal ambition ahead of the welfare of his country.

It was difficult to know just what the future holds for the nations participating in this war. Thrones had been overthrown by the ferment of democracy in Europe and he did not think the movement had ended with Russia. Whether Germany and Austria would be as seriously affected as was the Empire of the Czar he doubted, as he felt that the people of Germany and Austria were more thoroughly accustomed to autocratic rule and their revolt against it would scarcely go to the lengths of Russia. In some form or other the same ferment of democracy would find manifestation throughout the world, but any changes wrought in existing systems would be by peaceful, orderly means.

Referring to political conditions in England, he expressed the opinion that the Lloyd George government would be successful in its appeal to the people, but believed that at the next election after that a labor ministry would be placed in control with a strong radical platform.

The toll he had largely borne the burden of this war, so far as the actual fighting is concerned and he would naturally feel that as a reward for his efforts in that direction he was entitled to a larger place in the industrial, social and economic life of the country than he had had in the past. This had been the case in Canada as established by statistics obtained from the Department of Militia and Defence a few months ago, which showed that of the Canadian enlistment to that time 65 per cent of the men were classed on their attestation cards as skilled or unskilled laborers.

In Great Britain and France the proportion would probably run a trifle higher. All in Canada must look forward to a readjustment of the place labor has occupied in the administration of the country.




