The Feeble-Minded Menace—Happy Homes for Normal Children's Home an interesting session of the managing committee of the Children's Aid Society on Wednesday afternoon. Some of the problems that came up created considerable discussion, and the decisions reached in all of the cases cannot help but have fremendous influence on the future of the children immediately interested. The problem of feeblemindedness, with the complications which was one which the committee were filled upon to consider. The agent was authorized to take in two boys, both of tender years, if satisfactory arrangements could be made. The mother of these two ladys, who are both bright, has been deserted by her husband for four years, and in all that time she has maintained herself and her children without the slightest help from him. Now, however, the burden has become too great for her, and there are no mothers' allowances.

The children of a feeble-minded family presented the gravest problem. One of the boys belonging to this unfortunate family was admitted to the Home but it was found that he had been guilty of very grave misconduct. As the society has not the means to deal with such, and as it is manifestly unfair to the other children who are their wards to keep them, it was resolved to send the lad to some institution where he could be trained to do some useful work and be educated. His only sister is in the Home and an older brother has not a good record.
