## SINKS SHIPS, THEN GIVE A WARNING

Washington Regards Berlin Report as Bit of Grim Humor

Washington, June 14.—In view of what has been happening during the last few weeks, officials here last night were inclined to regard as a bit of grim humor a report from Berlin that the German government is about to declare the eastern American coast a danger zone and to warn neutral shipping of its purpose. Raiding submarines have already served warning of the danger in more forceful terms than Berlin could formulate in a diplomatic communication. Several of the eighteen vessels sunk by the raiders were neutral, carrying no war supplies. Neutral governments are not likely to have overlooked that fact, warning or no warning.

So far as Allied and American ships are concerned, the "warning" can make no difference. The raiders, while treating passengers and crews of the ships they waylaid with a consideration that is worthy of note only because it is a departure from the ruthlessness of accepted German practice elsewhere, have conducted cruiser warfare under a strictly German interpretation of what that means. Unarmed merchant craft of no military value have been summarily dealt with. The only armed craft sunk was torpedoed without warning.

It is assumed that any announcement from Berlin would be designed chiefly to intimidate neutral shipping. Even there, however, the urgent demand at home for supplies procurable only in the United States and the glittering freight rates obtainable probably would overcome any anxiety neutral ship owners might experience as a result of a "warning."

Perhaps the German admiral hopes to stimulate home readers in Germany with the idea that steps have been taken to stop the flow of American troops to Europe. Actual enforcement of a U-boat blockade, however, is the only thing that would in fact serve to interfere with that flow.

## BORDEN AND ROWELL AT A BRITISH WAR CABINET SESSION

Lords and Commons to Give Dinner for Overseas Ministers Next Week

London, June 13.—(Canadian Associated Press).—Sir Robert Borden, accompanied by Hon. Mr. Rowell, attended another session of the war cabinet today. All the ministers attended the first meeting on Tuesday, but only two ministers from each dominion will attend subsequent meetings. The Canadian premier yesterday held a long conference with General Currie, who came to London specially to meet him. Sir Robert also had an interview with General Smuts, and later saw Bishop Fallon. The British House of Lords and the House of Commons are to give a parliamentary dinner to the overseas ministers in the royal galleries of the House of Lords next week. The guests will be received by the lord chancellor and the speaker. The speech of welcome will be delivered by Premier Lloyd George.

## BODY OF DR. QUIGLEY TAKEN TO NEWCASTLE

Law Society Adopt Resolutions Relative to Passing Away of Prominent Barrister

The body of Dr. R. F. Quigley, K. C., whose lamented death took place yesterday, was taken to his sister's home in Newcastle on the 7:10 train this morning. It was accompanied by Mrs. Richard O'Brien. The funeral will take place Sunday. It is understood that the Knights of Columbus of this city will send a delegation to attend the funeral.

The following resolutions, moved by A. Powell, K. C., and seconded by Daniel Mullin, K. C., were adopted this afternoon:

Resolved, The members of the St. John Law Society have heard with great regret of the death of their fellow member, Richard F. Quigley, K. C., and they desire to place upon record their appreciation of his character and attainments.

The most striking feature of the deceased was his wide and exact scholarship, his reputation for which extended beyond the limits of his native province and won for him marked recognition abroad.

He received from the University of Laval the degree of Doctor of Literature and of Doctor of Laws and the Vatican conferred upon him an honor rarely bestowed by it of enrolling him as a doctor of philosophy.

While his love of literature, philosophy and science engendered a great deal of his attention, he was recognized as a profound student of law and was connected professionally with some of the most important cases in the province.

His professional career, like his private life, was characterized by a profound sense of honor, a courtesy ever manifest to all and a steadfastness of friendship and a tolerance of other people's opinions which endeared him to those who had the pleasure of associating with him. His death will leave a vacancy in the ranks of the profession which it will be very difficult to fill.

Further resolved, That these resolutions be entered by the secretary on the records of the society and that a copy thereof be forwarded by him to the brothers and sisters of the deceased to whom the society extends its sympathy in their bereavement.

## PTE. ERNEST COOK IN HOSPITAL FROM EFFECTS OF GAS

Mrs. Samuel Cook, 29 Cranston avenue, received a telegram from Ottawa at noon today announcing the death of her son, Pte. Ernest Cook, infantry, had been reported admitted to the 9th General Hospital, Rouen, on June 5, suffering from gas.

Private Cook enlisted in Windsor, Ont., and went overseas in 1915. He had previously been in the gold mines of Nevada and was on his way home when he enlisted. He had been away from St. John for ten years, but is well remembered by many old friends. He is now thirty-four years old. His father died in the same week that he enlisted. His friends will hope to hear that the soldier's condition is not serious.
