WHEN SUN YAT SEN GAVE UP THE SEALS OF OFFICE

The Scene in Peking—Mandate to The Five Races in China to Intermarry and Become a Single People

(Times' Special Correspondence)
Peking, June 2.—Some interesting features marked the sitting of the Republican Assembly at Nankin, at which the retiring president, Dr. Sun Yat Sen, and the members of the provisional republican government formally relinquished the seal of office. No public interest whatever was manifested in the event. The only visitors were the population of the republic the day after tomorrow. A military brass band was employed to entertain the assembly, and the old cabinet walked to their places to the strains of a German march. The music having run its course, the speaker announced that the retiring president would address a farewell message to the assembly. The president then took the red bag containing the seals of office and solemnly placed them before the speaker of the assembly. PLAYGROUNDS WORK MAKING PROGRESS IN NOVA SCOTIA CAPITAL

Supervised playgrounds are making progress in Halifax. In a letter to the press, urging a generous response to the tag-day appeal to the citizens next Saturday for funds, the convener of the playground committee of the Women's Council of the city, Mrs. J. W. MacFarlane, said: "In 1910 a young man living near Bloomfield playground told one of our teachers he wished something could be arranged so that working lads could have an evening playground. It was too late to do anything that season, but last year, with the permission of the school board the council opened Bloomfield playground June 1st to August 31st, every evening from 5 till dark. Mr. McKinnon was engaged to take charge and a very large number of men and boys took advantage of the opportunity to play baseball, cricket and other games."

He writes that the first week 920 were on the three playgrounds, Bloomfield, the Cotton Mill field and the Brewery field. The opening game of the ball team was played at Bloomfield June 11th before 300 spectators, 14th league game at Bloomfield, 200 spectators, 18th game at Bloomfield between Bloomfield and Northern, 225 spectators, 19th game at Richmond, 150 spectators, 20th game at Richmond, Grove vs. Hillside, 200 spectators, 21st, Bloomfield, practice, 50 playing ball, 20 playing quarts.

MINISTER UNDER ARREST

Philadelphia, June 27.—Ministerial associations of this city and Camden, N. J., have as the beginning of a campaign, caused the arrest of the Rev. Charles Cowdell of Camden, a Methodist and pastor of the Broadway church, and a man named Kemple. They were held in \$300 bail each on the charge of violating the laws relating to the performance of marriages. Under the law no marriage can be performed in New Jersey until twenty-four hours after the issuance of a license.
