## NOVA SCOTIA CITY OF 15,000 TO 20,000 SOULS

A Newspaper Man Sees Stel-  
arton, New Glasgow and  
Westville United

MANY FINE INDUSTRIES

New Car Works, Steel Works  
and Other Busy Places Visited

The Thickest Coal Seam in  
the World—Bright Future for  
New Glasgow

Fred E. Cox, of the Middleton Outlook,  
contributed to that paper the following  
description of the great industries in New  
Glasgow, Trenton and Stellarton, as seen  
during the recent Maritime Press con-  
vention at New Glasgow:

The auto first came to the top of Fraser  
Mountain, a high hill overlooking the  
vicinity of New Glasgow. From this ele-  
vation it claimed one can on a clear day  
see portions of five counties and P. E. Is-  
land.

From the bird's eye view the visitors  
obtained a glance the situation of the  
different towns of Pictou County and the  
different industrial establishments in the  
vicinity of New Glasgow. Some eight or  
ten miles to the north was Pictou har-  
bor and town. Following from the har-  
bor up the East River are Trenton, New  
Glasgow, Stellarton and Westville.

A City of 15,000 to 20,000 People

The population of Trenton is about  
1,000, of New Glasgow 6,000, Stellarton  
2,000 and Westville 4,000. In passing from  
Trenton to New Glasgow and from the  
latter to Stellarton a stranger cannot tell  
when one town is left and another entered  
the population is so continuous, but a  
few miles of unsettled space lies be-  
tween Stellarton and Westville, Trenton,  
Stellarton and New Glasgow really form  
one town and probably will before long be  
united. There is already an agitation  
to unite the two first named. With  
the growth of population Westville may  
also be included before many years. A  
city of 15,000 to 20,000 people in Pictou  
Co. is one of the probabilities of the early  
future.

The Car Works

The site of the new car works at Tren-  
ton was first visited. Excavations are  
being made over an area of 50 acres. The  
buildings will include a main building  
1100 x 300, paint shop 1100 x 150 feet,  
power house, steel foundry, offices, etc.  
The cost will be \$2,000,000. The initial  
capacity will be 60 cars per day and  
plans provided for extensions when need-  
ed.

At the start 1,000 to 1,200 permanent  
employees will be required which it is  
expected will mean an increase of 2,800  
to 3,000 of population. Extensive dredging  
works and the building of shipping piers  
are also expected at this point. The car  
works are to be ready in about a year.

The Steel Works

The mills of the Nova Scotia Steel &  
Coal Co., were next visited. Here 1000  
men are employed, but increasing. The  
company's plants at Sydney Mines and  
iron mines at Wabana, N. F. 6000 men  
are employed. The steel used at the  
New Glasgow mill is brought from Syd-  
ney Mines as great ingots about four  
feet square and two feet square. It was very  
interesting to watch the process by which  
these great ingots were converted into  
smaller articles in some cases into rods  
a half an inch in diameter.

Railway spikes were being turned out  
by these machines, railway plates from an-  
other, car axles were being made at an-  
other, and at another a great steamer  
shaft. The last named was most interest-  
ing. By means of great cranes operated  
by means of electricity a great steel shaft  
weighing 14 tons was swung from the fur-  
nace to the hydraulic hammer under  
which the heated end was to be shaped. The  
hammer is a German machine, the only  
one of its kind in Canada we understand.  
It exerts such a pressure that the great  
steel shafts are crushed as if it were made  
of butter. The work which it formerly per-  
formed hours to perform by pounding with  
a power hammer is now done in a few  
minutes by pressure.

Another remarkable thing at this mill  
is the cutting of steel sheets two inches  
thick by the Oxo-acetylene flame.

Other Factories

The Brown Machine Co., owned by J.  
A. Stang and David Brown was next  
visited. This was started four years ago.  
Here we saw more great cranes, lathes  
and machines. Milling and other machin-  
ery is built here. A couple of big screws  
for dredging purposes were being built  
at these works. About 120 men are em-  
ployed.

The largest bridge can be built now by  
these works. About 5,000 tons of iron  
and steel is handled yearly. Steel plates  
100 ft. size are imported from Pennsylvania  
and kept in stock for bridge construction.  
Our next call was upon the Fraser Ma-  
chine and Motor Co. This firm is five  
years old and seventy-five men are em-  
ployed making gasoline engines of every  
description. The Canada Tool & Specialty  
Co. employs about fifty-five men. Mat-  
hods, rifle sights, target practice rods and  
other specialties were being made. An or-  
der to replace the sights on 20,000 Ross  
rifles was being filled for the Dominion  
Government.

The factory of the Standard Drain Pipe  
Co. was most interesting. The sewer pipe  
just laid in Middleton came from this fac-  
tory. The plant cost about \$200,000 and  
100 men are employed. It is a branch of  
the works at St. John's, Que., but so superior  
is the clay at New Glasgow that more pipe  
is turned out at the branch than at the  
headquarters. There are nine circular  
kilns with a combined capacity of five  
or six carloads of pipe.

A Coal Town

Time did not permit of a visit to the  
other factories. But an auto run to Stel-  
larton enabled us to get an idea of a pic-  
ture of coal mining town. About 6,000  
men are employed in the coal mines at  
Stellarton and Westville. A controlling  
interest in the Acadia Coal Co. has lately  
been purchased by capitalists of Belgium  
and Belgian officials have been placed in  
charge. This company owns a large part  
of the town of Stellarton.

The thickest coal seam in the world, the  
Albion is here and the first railway built  
in America was from Stellarton to Pictou  
Harbor. In passing through New Glasgow  
the residence of R. E. Chambers was  
pointed out to us. Mr. Chambers was the  
man who discovered the iron deposits at  
Wabana, Newfoundland, and laid the  
foundation for the success of the Nova  
Scotia Steel & Coal Co. and I suppose that  
the thing that impressed me was the  
staunchness of the development in the  
vicinity of New Glasgow. But little has  
been said of it outside, yet a great indus-  
trial centre has been established here and  
much wealth has been accumulated. When  
it was decided to establish car works a  
few men got together one day in New  
Glasgow and subscribed two million dol-  
lars. Some of this stock was later put on  
the market but local men stood good for  
the investment.

The future of New Glasgow appears to  
be assured. With the broad and safe  
foundation already laid and the undertak-  
ing already laid out this must be a great  
manufacturing city which in time will  
rival old Glasgow.
