ROYAL PROCESSION THROUGH LONDON CITY

Magnificent Spectacle of Today Gives People Good Chance to See Their Majesties

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Cheered as Colonials' Carriages Pass—Indian Potentates Bear Wealth of Jewels—Spectacle Even More Imposing Than Was That of Yesterday

(Canadian Press) London, June 23—King George and Queen Mary today showed themselves to the masses as distinct from the more favored classes who were able to obtain access to the circumscribed area of yesterday's pageant.

These were placed off the parade and military staff, deputations of foreign officers, the royal suite, the members of the royal family, and the foreign princes, and Indian escorts who immediately preceded the state carriage.
