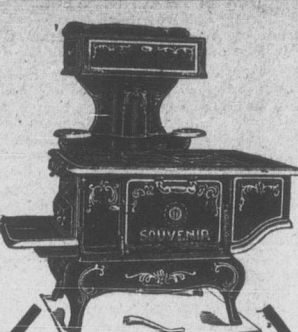

\$300,000 FOR BURNS.

Canadians who have watched with
no little pride the meteoric career
of the former lacrosse player, Tommy
Burns, (Nash Burns), are again be-
coming interested in ring affairs, for
Tommy is to fight what he says will
be his last battle at Sydney, Australia,
on the night of Tuesday, Decem-
ber 1, with big Jack Johnson, the col-
ored fighter, as his opponent. John-
son followed the Cammick to England

granted.
