Q.272	But the nature of your sickness was not such as to prevent you, should the occasion arise, should you have reason to do so, from getting up, leaving your bed and going anywhere in other words it was not such a sickness as might have kept you immobile - like a broken leg - or - could you get around I never not around for a prevent
A.272	I never got around for approximately the first four days.
Q.273	I'm not asking you whether you did. You have just told the Court that the MD diagnosed it as a slight case of flu. I believe that these were his words. That's right. I wasn't feeling such that I would want to get out of bed.
A.273	
Q.274 A.274	Tet it would have been quite within the realm of possibility: It was possib le, yes.
Q.274	I see: yes. Now, you say there were no other jeeps in the squadron available to send De Bartok and Tengum down. Is that correct?
A.274	That's correct.
Q.275	In other words when De Bartok and Tengum left for Gronigen, no jeeps were left in the squadron.
A.275	No. There was one jeep left in the squadron.
Q.276 A.276	You said there was no other. I said there was no other available for the trip.
Q.277 A.277	What was the other jeep? That was a jeep which I drove myself and which I would not let anybody else drive.
Q.278 A.278	There were two jeeps then? There were two jeeps. I might add - at that time.
Q.279	Now then, you stated that on Thursday morning when Corporal De Bartok and Corporal Tengus returned from Gronigen, they attended at your room. Is that correct?
A.279	That's correct.
Q.280 A.280	You also stated that there was a third party present, or shoul I say a fourth party, Lieutenant Coates. That's correct.
Q.281	Was Lieutenant Coates there already when De Bartok and Tengum arrived? Yes, he was.
A.281	
Q.282	He was there when they arrived?
A.282	He was there when they arrived.
Q.283 A.283	And did he remain until after they had gone? Yes. They were only in my room for a matter of a couple of minutes.
Q.284	I see. But he was there before they arrived and remained
A.284	there until after they had gone, is that right? Ies, certainly.
Q.285	Now then, you heard Corporal De Bartok tell me this morning you heard his evidence in which he said that you had allowed him to go down to Gronigen with Tengum and that ostensibly is was supposed to go down to bring wedding presents and he stated further that he was to go down with Tengum to dispose of the tirms and having disposed of the tirms that he could have a pass again the very next day.
A.285	Will you repeat the question. I don't just understand it.
Q.286	I just repeated what De Bartok said this morning. The explanation is this: Was De Bartok given leave of absence
A.286	himself from the unit, the following day? Not to my knowledge.
