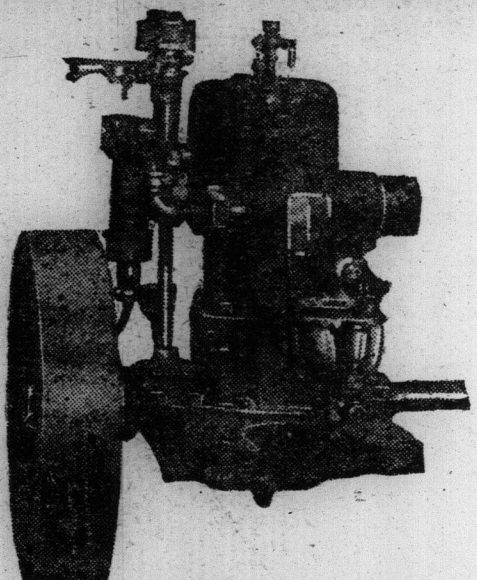

### No Traps Allowed on "Northern Ledge"

The Fisheries Board has recommended, and the Governor in Council has approved certain amendments to the Fishery Rules and Regulations.

An addition is added to Rule 48 which states that a bona fide cod-trap or a bona fide leader must be set in order to hold a trap berth. A cod-trap or leader must be twice knitted together at not less than 33 inch mesh in size. Traps shall not be less than 40 fathoms on the round, and from 6 to 15 fathoms deep.

The one that interests the fishermen of this section, especially the fishermen of French's Cove, is the repeal of the 6th paragraph, part of which is as follows:

"No codtraps or codnets shall be set on the fishing grounds off Bay Roberts Point, known as "Nother" or "Northern Ledge."

We understand that some time ago the fishermen of the Island Cove section sent in a petition asking for this amendment. The fishermen of Bay Roberts East sent in a counter petition. They claim that the fishing grounds off Bay Roberts Point was in a certain sense theirs, and should not be interfered with by the Island Cove fishermen.

It appears now that no notice was taken of the counter petition, and traps are debarred from being set on the "Northern Ledge."

### Consecration of St. Matthew's Church

His Lordship Bishop Jones spent the whole of Sunday, May 7th, in Bay Roberts. The Consecration of St. Matthew's Parish Church took place at 11 a.m., when his Lordship, with his Chaplain, was received at the west entrance by the Rural Dean, the Rector and Church Officials.

The petition for the Consecration having been presented and read, the Bishop, Clergy and Laymen proceeded up the Nave of the Church chanting the 24th Psalm. On reaching the Chancel, the Bishop proceeded to the sanctuary while the clergy and laity took their places.

Standing before the Altar, the Bishop said the appointed Prayers, followed by the Benediction of the Holy Table and of the Sacred Vessels, with prayer for all who should communicate. Passing to the Font, Lectern and Pulpit these were in turn dedicated to their sacred purpose. At the Chancel step special prayers were offered for all who should be Confirmed, Married, or who should worship there.

From the sanctuary, the Bishop then pronounced the Church dedicated and set apart forever for the "Ministration of the Holy Service and Mysteries of the Church of God."

The Sentences of Consecration was then read by the Rural Dean, signed by the Bishop and ordered to be enrolled amongst the Archives of the Diocese.

The Service of Holy Communion then began, the sermon being preached after the Recitation of the Nicene Creed.

The Bishop took for his text the 6th verse of the 95th Psalm: "O come, let us worship and fall down, and kneel before the Lord our Maker." He referred to the fact that on the first of May he entered on the 39th year of his own Consecration as Bishop of Newfoundland, and during his long Episcopate he had witnessed great improvements in church buildings. He referred to the old church and the long ministry of the Rev. W. C. Shears.

Speaking of the present church, His Lordship the Bishop said it stood in the front rank as one of the finest churches in the Diocese. He reminded the congregation that the church had been several years in use before he could consecrate it. He never consecrated a church un-

Some things he says are no doubt true, but we incline to the opinion that in speaking as he did about the Women's Association he did them a grave injustice and got after the wrong people.

Rev. F. Langford, B.A., Educational Secretary of Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues of the Methodist Church, visited our town on Wednesday. At the public meeting in Central Church that evening Mr. Langford won the hearts of all present by his clear, earnest and forceful presentation of the claims of Sunday School work. He outlined the work of the General Sunday School Board, giving a clear cut idea of its multifarious and extensive activities.

Then he dealt with the ten point Standard of Efficiency for Sunday Schools, and carried his hearers with him as he emphasized each point. It was a magnificent ideal that was thus unfolded before our workers. It showed the gap between the possible and the actual, but at the same time created earnest longings in many to endeavour to make the possible come actual. His visit has given new inspiration and encouragement to all who, like their Divine Master, love childhood and youth.
