

by a substantial part of the unfor tabor element, Mr. Gompers took an active part in the organization of the National Civic Federation, formed to establish better relations between He represented capital and labor. the federation and was vice-president of the organization. He also took part in many congresses conferences and conventions devoted to the promotion of social service.

He was affiliated with the Society for Ethical Culture of New York city, established in 1867 by Felix Adler, and in addition to the American Federation of Labor remained an active member of the Cigar-Makers' International Union. He also belonged to the Free and Accepted Mason; the Independent Order of Odd Pellows, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elka and the Home Club.

He was the author of numerous emall pamphlets in the nature of tracks on labor questions, wrote a book on the world labr movement, and edited the American Federation let, the official organ of the Ameri-

Throughout his career, Compers refused to become identified with any political party, taking the position that he could be of more service to the cause of labor by hiding himself aloof from identification with any single political or-

Mr. Gompers was twice married. His first wife, Sophis, Julian, of New York, died in 1919, shortly after the celebration of their 50th wedding anniversary. They had three sons and a daughter; the latter, a nurse in France, died during the war. On April 15, 1921, the labor leader, then 72 years old, married Mrs. Gertrude A. G. Neuscheler, 88 years old, a
