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FUTURE DISCOVERIES.

SOME GREAT CHANGES ARE VERY NEAR.

Searchlight of Inference Thrown Forward, Not Backward—World Changes.

Mr. H. G. Wells, the scientist and novelist who out-Darwin his master Darwin, and dares to direct a confident gaze upon a future still unborn, delivered a lecture at the Royal Institution, London, on "Discovery of the Future."

This did not mean an aerial flight, but a discovery of the future as a whole.
