

STAR THEATRE BROKEN INTO AND FILM TORN

Youngster Enters North End Picture House and Destroys Film—Is Allowed Off With a Warning.

On Thursday evening, when Mr. Golding of the Star Theatre, North End, went to his picture house he discovered that the lock on the front door had been opened and the place entered. On further investigation it was found that the room in which the machine is operated had also been entered, the machine tampered with and things about the room generally disturbed. The person who had forced his way into the theatre had also tried to secure some of the tickets from the box by turning it up side down and shaking it. Sergeant Kilpatrick was immediately notified and yesterday succeeded in founding up the intruder. Nothing, however, had been stolen from the theatre and the guilty person was allowed off with a warning. The lad, who is about sixteen years old, told Golding that he only desired to see if he could operate the machine.

It was learned afterwards that the boy had entered the place about an hour before the show and ran a reel through the machine. A film valued at \$200 was torn, but can easily be repaired.

PLEGGED HIS MONEY ON SUCCESS OF HIS ANTARCTIC VENTURE

Captain Scott's Estate Involved in Expenses of Trip to South Pole—Lord Curzon Makes Announcement.

London, Feb. 14.—Lord Curzon of Kedleston, in a letter regarding the various funds started in connection with the Scott disaster, says that before the question of providing a memorial is considered nearly \$150,000 will be needed to meet the outstanding liabilities incurred by the expedition and to relieve the estate of Captain Scott, who pledged a large portion of his own and Mrs. Scott's fortunes to the expenses of the venture.

It will be necessary also to provide for the adequate publication of the scientific results so laboriously collected and tabulated by Capt. Scott up to almost the last hour of his life. Lord Curzon suggests that the memorial should take the form of a hall to be called the "Scott Memorial Hall" and it should be dedicated to the remembrance of the scene to which Captain Scott and his companions yielded their lives.

Ask For Grant.

Among the items which will probably be included in the order sheet for Monday's meeting of the council is the application for a civic grant on behalf of the Monastery of the Good Shepherd. Up to the present there has been no grant made, although every year large numbers of female prisoners have been committed to the institution, the terms varying from a couple of months to over a year.

PATROL ICE INFESTED REGIONS OF ATLANTIC

Former Antarctic Exploring Ship Secured to Protect Shipping in North Atlantic—Sails Soon from Dundee.

London, Feb. 14.—The board of trade announces that the whaling ship Scotia, formerly employed in the Scottish Antarctic expedition, has been engaged to patrol the ice regions in the North Atlantic for the purpose of notifying wireless stations on the American coast and steamers of the location of icebergs and similar dangers.

This is in accordance with the negotiations recently entered into by the British government and the North Atlantic steaming lines. The Scotia will be equipped with a powerful wireless installation. She will leave Dundee at an early date.

away," he said. "Why cut off this market for the fishermen of North Sydney. Such a course would only send the French trawlers, who are the most aggressive, away to St. Pierre and Newfoundland."

Mr. Hazen said that Newfoundland already had a three-mile limit, and there trawling is done. Later he read a letter from the French consul in Sydney stating that less than four dozen French trawlers are operating in this vicinity.

Mr. Puseley also deplored the cutting off of a lucrative trade from Sydney.

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LIBERALS FAILED TO PROTECT.

Mr. Jamieson pointed out effectively that the Liberals had failed to protect the fishermen when they were in power, and had begun their period of opposition by consulting the Conservative government for not doing at once what they had failed to do. Now they declined to accept the bill which would help the fishermen.

Nearly all the Maritime Province Liberals fought the measure.

Mr. Carroll supported Mr. McKenzie's proposal to make a bill supporting the bill, discovered reservations.

Mr. Kite declared that the bill would help the travelling difficulty. Mr. Chabohm (Antigonish), took the same attitude.

Mr. McCurdy observed that not only was this a step towards the abatement of the nuisance, but Mr. Hazen's announcement had had the effect of reviving Canadian firms from entering the steam trawler business.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey submitted the annual report of the chief commissioner of public works.

The Debt Redemption Bill.

The house went into committee with Mr. Dickson (Albert), in the chair, and took up the consideration of the bill to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of the public debt.

Premier Fleming explained that the \$50,000 which had been placed in the sinking fund to be used for the purchase of money paid by the Grand Falls Co., Ltd., for the transfer of certain lands and rights in the Grand Falls water power under a provision in the lease, which was executed in 1907. He said that one reason for making this explanation was that he wanted to make the members of the house and the people of the province understand that the arrangement was not made by the present administration.

There had been placed in the fund \$18,553.48 for the transfer to the National Transcontinental Railway of the right of way in the town of Sydney in the province. This was the amount paid up to the close of the last fiscal year. The National Transcontinental Railway had been granted the right of way on the basis of \$18,000 per acre, and they had used it all something over 1,500 acres. There was in addition nearly 7 acres of land on the water front in the town of Edmonstone which the railway also took over, and for which they paid \$200 per acre.

Federal Infantry Revolts.

It was coincidental with the cessation of the firing that a battalion of the twentieth infantry revolted. All but a handful of these federals succeeded in joining Diaz. This battalion was stationed along Independence street. The men suddenly turned up on their officers and shot them down, but the sound of these shots did not attract general attention in the fire. The entire battalion broke for the rear lines, reaching there in safety. Thirty-eight of them were overpowered, however, by the loyal troops and were marched to the palace, probably to be executed.

Although the firing on both sides was lighter today, the total number of shells used was enormous and the incidental destruction of property great. The loss of life among the non-combatants as a result of the shelling probably was less than on the other days, because every one who had strength enough moved out of the districts near the centre of the operations and by reason of the fact that the rebels confined their artillery action largely to streets threatened by assault.

Bullets whistled here and there in all parts of the city. They were fired across the town by both sides, from the house tops and other places where sharpshooters could be stationed.

With a beautiful moon and good sleighing, there was a large number of sleighing parties out last night and with the ringing of bells, blowing tin horns and singing the happy crowd appeared to be enjoying themselves.
