Miss Leitha White spent the Thanksgiving vacation at her home here, returning to Sackville, where she is attending school on Tuesday.

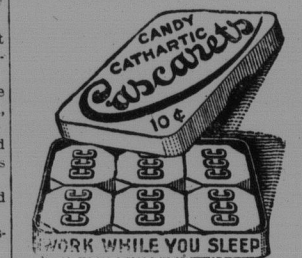

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in the Northwest, subject to certain conditions. Applicant must appear in person at the District Office. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (not sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Section—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years, or a homesteaded section on a farm of at least 40 acres, subject to certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$1.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, or a homesteaded section on a farm of at least 40 acres, subject to certain conditions. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homesteaded patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in the Northwest. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, or a homesteaded section on a farm of at least 40 acres, subject to certain conditions. Reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 2560 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton, in unworked coal, and one cent per ton in worked coal, to be paid to the landowner by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or two Agents of Dominion Lands for the district must be made in all cases made, and the rental for the first year must be paid to the Agent within thirty days after filing application.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery, may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. The claim may be, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been paid to the Mining Recorder, the claim may be purchased by the applicant in person, and personal application to the Agent or two Agents of Dominion Lands for the district must be made in all cases made, and the rental for the first year must be paid to the Agent within thirty days after filing application.

PLACING MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet long and 100 to 2,000 feet wide. Entry fee \$5. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development of the claim. Repeal, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent, after the output exceeds \$10,000.
