SHELL FISH COMMISSION

Something About Duties and Makeup of Important Board Appointed by Dominion Marine and Fisheries Department—Prof. Prince, in Interview, Praises St. John Salmon.

A meeting of the Dominion government shell fish commission will be held in the mayor's office at city hall this morning at 9:30 o'clock, to hear the views of local dealers and fishermen in regard to the needs and conditions of the shell fish industry.

The object of the commission which will visit all the fishing districts, is to gain first hand information in regard to the conditions of the industry, and find out the opinions of fishermen on the laws and regulations governing these fisheries.

The members of the commission are Prof. Prince of Ottawa, Hon. W. McLean, of P. E. I., Richard O'Leary, of Richibucto, and S. Y. Wilson, of Halifax. Prof. Prince is an expert on all fishery questions, having been in the employ of the British government for many years before he came to Canada, and has had long experience in the fish business.

Fishermen Show Interest. The commissioners have held sessions in Prince Edward Island, and in Charlotte county, and so far the meetings have been very successful, and well attended by fishermen.

Asked about the fisheries in the Pacific coast, Prof. Prince said Canada had in its territorial waters on the Pacific coast an extensive fishery, and that the industry there has attained great proportions, and many fishermen have brought out from Great Britain to assist in the fishing operations.

When he first visited the coast, he found the fishery in a state of decay, and the rivers were frequently littered with masses of salmon thrown back into the water. Now all the species of salmon are utilized, and sold in markets extending from Victoria to the Yukon.

Continued from page 1. At about 800 feet altitude he started to come down in a spiral glide. Because of the unusually small span of the machine, Peck got into too steep a spiral, his aeroplane slid in toward the centre of the vortex and he could not bring it back.

His real difficulty did not become apparent until he was within 200 feet from the ground. He would have escaped with minor injuries, Director Peck and his technical commission declared, had it not been for the fact that the heavy engine crashing through the framework struck the pilot tank and iron fastening, struck Peck in the neck and across the legs.

Peck in an American licensed aviator No. 57, and had developed a monoplane and the biplane in which he was injured. The biplane was of only 25 feet span, headless and equipped with a gyros motor. He is about 24 years of age.

Clean Gamblers Out Of the Tenderloin

Inspector Dwyer Raids Four-Story "Clubhouse" — Vice Trust Also Shuts Up Its Resorts. New York, N. Y., Sept. 11.—"Practically every gambling resort the New York Tenderloin has been closed up," declared Police Inspector John E. Dwyer early today, following a raid made by him and a squad of detectives on a four story "clubhouse" in West Forty-second street, near Broadway.

The "clubhouse" was equipped with a magnificent larder and an extensive wine cellar. Among the confiscated property were a number of telegrams from persons out of town directing that large sums of money be wired on horse races.

District Attorney Whitman heard yesterday that the six leaders of the vice trust had been arrested. He is in earnest. These men operated more than 20 disorderly houses in the Tenderloin until the houses were raided recently by Assistant District Attorney James E. Smith. The proprietors of 12 of the houses moved out yesterday. Lock, stock and barrel.

The six head vice men opened some of their houses again as soon as Mr. Smith's raiders were out of sight on Aug. 15 last. But yesterday they not only moved the furniture from the 12 houses mentioned, but also closed and padlocked the six other houses of the 18 that the district attorney's office has raided.

These "vice trust" houses were of the very lowest type and each resort housed about twenty-five women. Nevertheless each house was credited with an average weekly profit to the owners of about \$1,750. Also the furnishings and decorations represented a sum that ran further into the thousands than is generally thought.

The matter of the estate of Josephine Anne Allan, wife of Thomas R. Allan, of Lancaster, machinist, came up. She died intestate leaving her husband and a son by a former husband, Scott I. Litchfield, of Cliftondale, Mass., navy yard employe. On the petition of the husband and the son, Clarence B. Allan, of St. John was appointed administrator. Real estate is \$2500; personal property \$750. Baxter and Logan are protectors.


