IN THE EDITOR'S MAIL

The Editor of The Standard: In yesterday's issue of The Standard Commissioner Bullock is reported as commenting at a meeting of the common council on the "increasing expenditures for school purposes, and the desirability of letting the people know how much the public schools are costing. The commissioner was for many years a member of the school board and the chairman of its finance committee, so he should know whereof he speaks. But is he stating facts or "hearing himself talk?" From my tax bills I have not been able to discover that school expenditures are increasing more rapidly than those controlled by the commissioner and his colleagues in the council. On the contrary I find that from 1911 to 1915, when Commissioner Bullock was a member of the school board, the percentage of the city assessment devoted to schools was 28; while for the next five years from 1915 to 1920 when he was not a member, the percentage was 21-3. Again the expenditure for 1920, of which he particularly complained, was less proportionately than of 1914.
