"Twelve new battleships of the super-dreadnought type are now practically ready for sea. Four of these, the four largest and most powerful weapons of offence that have ever been placed on the water, are 850 feet long, with a speed of over thirty knots, and are armed with twelve 18-inch guns.

"No such armament as this has ever before been contemplated in the history of naval architecture, and it is considered that ships of this type are capable of winning any sea fight in which they may be engaged."

## Dr. J. T. Lewis and Dr. S. O. THE EMPIRE HONORS "CHIPPY" KERR, V. C.

Nova Scotia Lad Who Won Highest Military Honor, Enlisted in the West But Was Drafted Into the Reserve of the 25th Nova Scotians-No Details, Yet-Is Now in Hospital.

(Special to The Telegraph.)

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 27-The greatest military honor known in the British Empire and coveted by every man wearing the King's uniform has been won by a Cumberland boy, John C. Kerr, of Fox River, N. S., a son of Capt. Robt. Kerr and a brother to Gesner Kerr. The hero is well known in town as the family formerly resided here. lesner Kerr received the information relative to his brother's eroism from Halifax but no details regarding his bravery accom-

panied the official communication.

"Chippy" Kerr, however, was wounded in the same battle where he so distinguished himself and is now a patient in Ketesgrove war hospital, Reading, England. The Cumberland boy enlisted with a western battalion but on the arrival of the unit in England the thousand men were broken up into drafts and Chipman Kerr was one of the men that reinforced th 25th Nova Scotians.

Passing safely through the furore and tumult of the Ypres salient he, with the Blue Noses marched to the Sommé front about a month ago. After the taking of Courcellete, Chipman Kerr's name was announced among the wounded. It is evident that he distinguished himself greatly at this point on the Somme, where the Nova Scotians and French-Canadians won immortal fame.




