LACK OF PRINCIPLE

DUBLIN, March 16.—Eamonn de Valera, "president of the Irish Republic," gave an Associated Press correspondent today the first newspaper interview he has accorded since returning to Ireland from the United States. Extraordinary precautions were observed to prevent betrayal of de Valera, the correspondent being guided to him by a member of the "Irish Volunteers" and kept under surveillance for an hour after leaving the Sinn Fein leader.

Among other things, de Valera ac-

Among other things, de Valera accused the British Government of lacking principle and statesmanship.
"England," he said, "is trying to win by playing on human weakness. As a matter of fact, she is playing on the strongest quality of the Irish people—their spiritual quality. The young men of Ireland are saying to themselves:

men of Ireland are saying to themselves:

"At best the span of life is only 70 years. We must all die. So why not now in circumstances like these?"

The correspondent was placed in the side-car of a motorcycle and made to don goggles, which effectively blinded him. He was not allowed to note the intricate route taken by the motorcycle through Dublin. On leaving the private house in which he talked to De Valera the correspondent was twice held up and examined, once by members of the Irish Republican Army and once by crown forces.

De Valera declared that there was no truth in the rumors of overtures for a truce or peace, or that the Dail Eireann had laid down new conditions.

Questioned as to whether the offer of full fiscal autonomy would induce acceptance of the patition act, the Sinn Fein leader said that the act was made by a "foreign hostile assembly, and that therefore "the Irish people as a whole would never accept it."



Collegiate May Be

Tax of \$1,200 a Day On Race Tracks Where Betting Is Allowed.

QUEBEC, March 16.—The new license bill sponsored by Provincial Treasurer Mitchell provides for a tax of \$200 on film exchanges; \$10 a day for each race meeting within a radius of 30 miles of Montreal and \$8 a day in Quebec, but if there is any betting the license fee shall be \$1.200 a day on one-mile tracks, \$600 a day on half-mile tracks and \$300 a day for other tracks, with double these fees if the pari-mutuel system of betting is not used.

Every person betting at a pari-mutuel meeting must pay a duty equal to 10 per cent of the amount deposited.

No betting may be carried on outside the pari-mutuel method unless a special license is issued on payment of a duty of \$1,000 a day.

THE PROBLEM

The problem is to draw a chain of circles once across the chart, from the first column on the left to the last column on the right, selecting the figures to encircle from which you can obtain the greatest difference between the sum total of the even and the sum total of the odd figures. The odd figures are 3, 5, 7 and 9, and the even, 2, 4, 6, 8. By "sum total" is meant the figures added together. That is, you are to take the odd figures you put circles around, and add them up; then the even figures, and the difference between the two totals is your solution. It makes no difference which of the two sum totals is the larger; the greatest difference you can obtain either way is what counts.

The chain must be drawn in continuous sections of

tain either way is what counts

The chain must be drawn in continuous sections of either three, four or five circles to a section. By "section" is meant three, four or five circles in a straight line. You may use either number of circles you wish in each section. The sections of the chain may go either up or down, or to the right, but not to the left. That is, start in the first column by drawing either three, four or five circles up or down, as you wish; then proceed to the right, then up or down again; then to the right, and so on until you reach the last column. The chain must end with either three, four or five circles in this column.

In determining the number of circles in each section count the last circle in one section as the first in the next. The figures in the corner circles, however, are to be counted but once when adding them up to get the totals of the odd and even figures. You may start at any figure you wish in the extreme left-hand column. There must be one section running up or down in this column as well as in the last column.

Contestants should try all the combinations they can to see what is the greatest difference they can obtain between the sum total of the odd figures and the sum total of the even, or vice-versa. The prizes will be awarded for the greatest differences submitted, without regard to what the greatest possible difference that can be obtained may be. Only the figures you put circles around are to be considered. The following illustration will furnish a general idea for drawing your chain of circles. The illustration consists of double figures, such as 46, 69, 75, and so on, but the puzzle contains only single figures from 2 to 9. Hence the differences will be comparatively much smaller and the sum totals easier to obtain. Contestants should try all the combinations they

ILLUSTRATION

The accompanying illustration explains what a chain of circles is. The first section, it will be noted, consists of four circles; the second, three; the third, three, and so on. The sum total of the even numbers, 46, 58, 92, etc., is 750, and the sum total of the odd numbers, viz., 69, 75, 83, etc., 892. The difference between these totals is 142.
