VETERANS OF BRITAIN'S WARS ASSEMBLE AT BANQUET BOARD

Paardeberg Heroes and Others Who Fought and Bled For British Supremacy on Many a Stoutly Contested Field Modestly Recount Deeds That Have Stirred the Patriotic Heart in Years Gone by—Banquet Room Splendidly Decorated—The Toasts and Replies—Presentation to Canon Montgomery, Who is Resigning Chaplaincy of Association.

The York County South African Veterans' Association last evening celebrated the 8th anniversary of the great battle of Paardeberg with one of the most pleasant banquets held in the city, the success of the affair surpassing the expectations of the most ardent. Veterans seated about the festive board at the spacious dining hall of the Waverley Hotel bedecked with medals and accompanied by their friends enjoyed a sumptuous repast, excellently served under the supervision of Head Waiter Charles Williams, and later listened to brilliant and patriotic speeches, as well as musical numbers, which could not fail to please.

During the progress of the banquet an excellent musical programme was furnished by the City Orchestra and the dining hall was artistically decorated with flags, hunting rifles, etc., the droll boquets including a massive one tied with red, white and blue ribbons, which was sent to the Association with the compliments of the Daughters of the Empire.

The feature of the evening was the presentation which was made to Rev. Canon Montgomery, chaplain of the Association, who resigned the position, it being the case of his departure for Port Hope, Ont., where he becomes rector. The reverend gentleman proposed the toast to the Departed Comrades, which was drunk in silence, followed by the Last Post bugle call.

The Toast List.

When the excellent repast had received due attention President Pringle proposed the toast to the King with brief introductory remarks. In the course of which he welcomed the guests of the Association.

The toast was received with the singing of the National Anthem.

To Canada and the Empire.

Capt. P. A. Guthrie, in an eloquent speech, proposed the toast to Canada and Nation, Britain and Empire, in which he referred to the many grand deeds of Canadian soldiers and the pride of all in Canadian citizenship.

The toast was enthusiastically received with the singing of The Maple Leaf Forever.

The toast was replied to by Judge Wilson, whose chief military duty was to belong to the Nashwaakels Company, which assisted in the welcome to this city of the Prince of Wales, and the drill sergeant was Capt. McKenzie, who was with General Havelock when they marched upon Lucknow. Another present was Captain the Hon. Thos. Ashburnham, who was at the battle of Tel-el-Kebir.

His Honor's speech was interspersed with witty remarks, which created much laughter. He hoped

that similar gatherings would be continued to be held periodically.

Captain Ashburnham also replied, and Capt. A. D. Thomas, who gave a patriotic speech which stirred the entire gathering as he spoke of the deeds of Canadians in defence of the Empire.

Mr. Cooper favored the gathering with the patriotic song, Britons None the Less, Sir.

To the Canadian Militia.

Quartermaster Sergt. Galloway proposed the toast to the Canadian Militia, which brought forth an eloquent speech from Col. Marsh, whose military experience commenced with 1860, when he had the honor of sweeping the colors on the arrival in this city of King Edward. Col. Marsh was the commanding officer of the 1st Battalion for twenty-three years.

Lieut. Col. Loggie also replied, as well as Capt. McKenzie, who had been soldiering since 1841. He had nursed the Princess Royal in the parks near London about the time that King Edward was born. His father had been at Waterloo in 1815.

Capt. J. D. Perkins, who was twice a member of the Wimbledon Team, recited Fuzzy Wuzzy, one of Kipling's. Mr. Sayce delighted the gathering with his rendition of Rainbows, and for an encore he sang Soldiers of the King.

"Our Departed Comrades."

Capt. Pringle called upon the chaplain of the Association, Rev. Canon Montgomery, to propose the toast to Our Departed Comrades.

To those whose bodies rest beneath the South African sods a great debt of respect was due. In connection with the British Empire it had fallen to the lot of Canada to play an important part. Canada to furnish the Empire with some of its heroes.

The speaker made special mention of Messrs. Riggs, Scott, Johnston, McCreery and Withers, who were the members of Company G slain at Paardeberg and gave the members of the Association good words of parting advice.

The Presentation.

Col. Marsh, on behalf of the York County South African Veterans' Association, with a suitable speech, presented Canon Montgomery with a solid leather suit case as a mark of esteem on the part of the veterans.

Canon Montgomery, who was much affected, briefly thanked the members of the Association. At the request of the Colonel he would retain the chaplaincy of the 71st Regiment and he expected to attend the camp of 1910.

The singing of Auld Lang Syne was followed by three cheers for Canon Montgomery and the singing of For He's a Jolly Good Fellow.

Judge Wilson, on behalf of the citizens of Fredericton, expressed regret at the departure from our midst of Canon Montgomery. The best wishes of the citizens would go with him for happiness and prosperity in his new field.

Sergt. Butler sang The British Navy and it made a decided hit and called forth an encore. The Shamrock, the Thistle and the Rose.

Drill Sergt. Instructor Warren proposed the toast to Our Guests, to which Judge Wilson responded.

Our Hosts.

Col. Marsh proposed the toast to Our Hosts, to which Capt. Pringle responded, as well as Vice-Presidents Galloway and Tibbits.

Mr. Fradsham sang Rule Britannia sweetly, the entire gathering joining in the chorus.

President Pringle referred to Pte. Harris, of the R. C. R., who went through the South African war and has the distinguished honor of having received the Queen's medal with eight bars.

Pte. Harris replied, saying that it had been only a matter of duty. Mr. Cooper sang his ever popular parody on The Old Apple Tree, which brought forth thunderous applause.

Mr. George Parker sang You've Got a Long Way to Go, which was vigorously encored.

Mr. Parker also proposed the toast to the Press.

Toast was responded to by J. D. Black, of The Gleaner.

Speeches were made by Lance Corporal Gomme and Sergt. Major Brewster, after which Capt. Guthrie proposed the toast to the proprietors of the Waverley Hotel, to which Mr. Edward H. Dewar briefly replied.
