

# Bus trips will get mothers' out of house

Instead of staying home this summer, Mississauga mothers will have the opportunity to take their children to beaches, conservation areas, on a lion safari and to Niagara Falls. For the first time, the

Mississauga Parks and Recreation Department has organized eight bus trips, from July 3 to August 21. The price of each trip varies. There is a tentative limit of 60 persons per trip, but if enough interest is shown,

more buses can be arranged. Buses will leave at the Petrescue Community Centre, Ogdan Avenue and Halliday. Children must be accompanied by an adult, and there is no charge for infants

who can ride on their mother's knee on the bus. As there are two sessions, registration for the first is June 26, and July 24 for the second, which will be held at the Petrescue Community Centre.

NOTICE OF APPLICATION TO THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD BY THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF OAKVILLE for approval of a By-law to regulate land use passed pursuant to Section 35 of The Planning Act.

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Oakville intends to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board pursuant to the provisions of Section 35 of The Planning Act for approval of the By-law Number 1974-46 passed on the 22nd day of April, 1974. A note giving an explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law and stating the lands affected thereby is furnished herewith.

ANY PERSON INTERESTED MAY, within fourteen (14) days after the date of this Notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Town of Oakville, notice of his objection to approval of the said by-law, together with a statement of the grounds of such objections.

ANY PERSON wishing to support the application for approval of the by-law may, within (14) days after the date of this notice, send by registered mail or deliver to the Clerk of the Town of Oakville notice of his support of approval of the said by-law together with a request for notice of any hearing that may be held giving also the name and address to which such notice should be given.

THE ONTARIO MUNICIPAL BOARD may approve of the said by-law but before doing so it may appoint a time and place when any objection to the by-law will be considered. Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection or notice of support and who have left with or delivered to the Clerk undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent.

THE LAST DATE FOR FILING OBJECTIONS will be July 10, 1974.

### SUMMARY BY-LAW NO. 1974-46

#### PURPOSE OF THE BY-LAW

The section of the Oakville Zoning By-law which lists the uses permitted in industrial zones (Section 46 (1) ) is replaced. The existing section to be deleted and the new section to be substituted therefor are both shown below.

#### EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

Car washes and retail sales outlets incidental to industrial uses will no longer be permitted. Those existing will become Legal Non-Conforming Uses; they will be able to continue, but not to expand without approval of the Committee of Adjustment.

#### LOCATION OF LANDS AFFECTED

All lands Zoned Industrial M1, M2, M3, M4, M5, in the Town of Oakville.

#### EXISTING SECTION 46(1) TO BE REPEALED:

##### 46. (1) Permitted Uses

(a) banks, service shops, coin-operated, automatic and do-it-yourself car washing establishments, parking areas and commercial undertakings incidental to an industrial use such as

- (i) retail showrooms and outlets for products made on the premises,
- (ii) sales, factory and other offices,
- (b) dairies, bakeries, printing shops;
- (c) warehousing and storage within enclosed buildings and the assembly of manufactured products such as textiles, woods, paper, light metal sections radio and television equipment and other similar products;

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- (d) the manufacture within enclosed buildings of radio and television equipment, drugs, cosmetics, jewelry and watches, toys, publishing and book binding, office equipment, sanitation products and any other light manufacturing operations which are not obnoxious by reason of erosion or the emission of noise, odour, dust, gas, fumes, smoke, refuse, or water-carried waste.
- (e) there shall in no circumstances be any outside storage of goods or materials.

#### NEW SECTION 46(1) TO BE ENACTED

##### 1/2 (1) "Permitted Uses"

(a) banks, service shops (not including retail sales of merchandise), parking areas;

- (b) dairies, bakeries, printing shops;
- (c) publishing and book binding;
- (d) warehousing and storage within enclosed buildings and the assembly of manufactured products such as textiles, woods, paper, light metal sections, radio and television equipment and other similar products;
- (e) the manufacture within enclosed buildings of radio and television equipment, drugs, cosmetics, jewelry and watches, toys, office equipment, sanitation products and any other light manufacturing operations which are not obnoxious by reason of erosion or the emission of noise, odour, dust, gas, fumes, smoke, refuse, or water-carried waste;
- (f) administrative offices related to, and on the same lot with, any use permitted in this sub-section;
- (g) there shall in no circumstances be any outside storage of goods or materials."

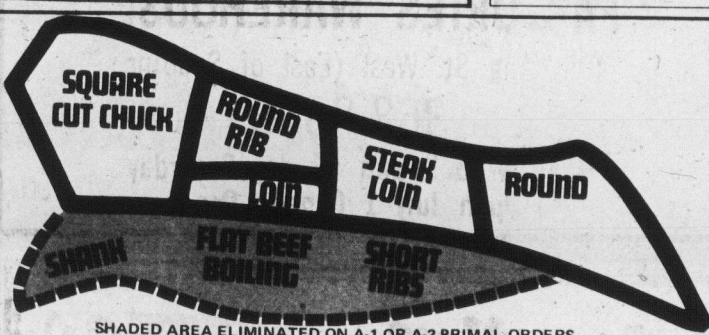

The criteria for color choice in frames are the same as in choosing clothes—personal coloring, and garment or mood matching. How you proceed with your selection depends, of course, on how much you are inclined to spend, and how you use your glasses. If your prescription permits on-and-off, or casual use, you may choose gay colors that match your mood or your wardrobe.

For constant wearers, preference is usually for a more subdued color. But there are sensible rules to follow, in which your optician is well able to assist.

- Choose a color that "belongs" on your face, and don't be afraid of some of the primaries. A deep wine is beautiful with black hair, and a redhead can wear a soft green, or coffee color, or dark tortoise to great effect. Black or deep blue are excellent for most blondes. Don't be afraid of color, so
- Don't forget that there is color, and color shade. For most flattering effect, choose the shade for its balancing "temperature"—a cool shade of the color for warm complexion tones, a warm shade if your skin tones are cool, or pale.
- Frame color and thickness should vary with the feature size: the larger, or heavier the features, the darker and thicker the frame.

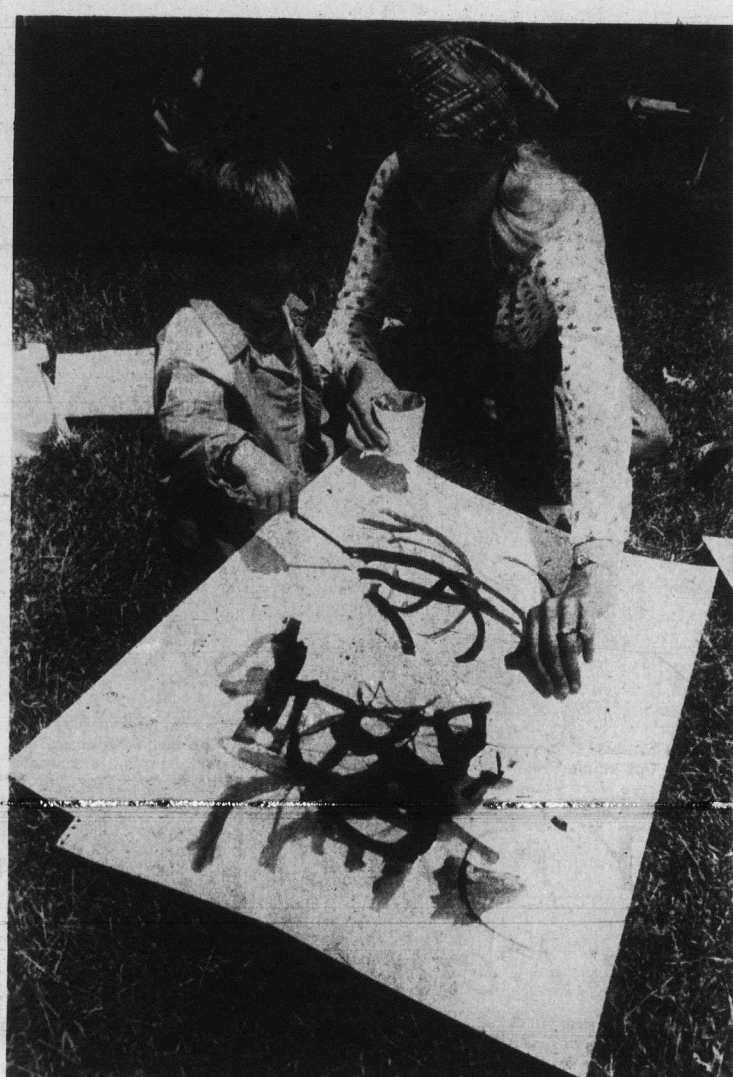

## homemaker's helper

Man has used eggs as food for a longer time than we can imagine.

Eggs of various animals have been eaten as food, such as turtle eggs. Man also eat fish eggs or roe. In some countries, ant eggs and other insect eggs are used as food. Primitive races are known to eat the eggs of reptiles and lizards. The egg we are concerned with is the hen's egg.

Eggs are nutritious, so we should try to eat at least three a week.

Whether they are brown or white makes no difference. The food value is exactly the same. I happen to like the brown-colored eggs.

Egg whites are versatile. An egg white makes a good facial. Beat one egg white until stiff but not dry stage. Pat on face with absorbent cotton, let dry completely and then wash off.

For recipes calling for eggs, remove from refrigerator ahead of time. They should be used at room temperature.

If you are using only the whites for baking, place the yolks in a bowl, cover with water, then cover bowl. They will keep several days like this. They can also be added to an omelet.

Be sure to use a glass or metal bowl to beat egg whites. China bowls may have a residue of oil in them which will prevent the whites from beating to stiff peaks.

When eggs are hard-boiled, remove from heat and run cold water over them to cool quickly. This will prevent formation of a dark ring around the yolk.

If you find a blood spot in an egg, just remove it and use as usual. It won't affect the taste or wholesomeness of the egg.

Everyone loves the look of toasted golden meringue heaped on a lemon pie. To make a wonderful meringue, beat two or more egg whites, and 1/4 cup of fine sugar, 1 tablespoon of water, and an 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar. Keep beating until the whites stand in stiff peaks. Bake in slow oven until golden brown in colour. To cut through meringue easily, dip a knife in hot water to make each cut.

If an egg yolk breaks while being separated from white, remove it with the corner of a clean cloth dipped in cold water. Egg shells dropped in the basket of a percolator will clarify the perking coffee.

An egg that floats on water is stale. Fresh eggs sink to the bottom.

If you haven't time to stop for breakfast, make an eggnog. This will keep you going for a few hours. This is also one way of getting children to eat eggs, if they won't have them any other way.
