200,000 CANADIAN SETTLERS. Stundists Are Preparing to Leave the

Czar's Country.

Berlin, Feb. 27.—Saturday's Berliner Zietung reports that 200,000 Russian Stundists are preparing to emigrate to Canada. The Stundists are members of a Rusisan religious community, originating about the year 1860. Their tenets and practices are distinctively evangelical and Protestant, and entailed separation from the Orthodox Greek Church. For a long period after 1870 they were very harshly persecuted by the Government, but remained faithful to their convictions and have considerably increased in numbers. Of recent ably increased in numbers. Of recent years little has been heard regarding the community, but from their resolu-tion to emigrate, it may be inferred that they are still the objects of Gov-ernment ill-will.
