**WAR IN CITY'S STREETS** 

Wounded Number Probably Five Times As Many-Polish City Resembles Shambles-Exedus in Progress, 12,000 Persons Having Already Left-Cossacks Unnecessarily Brutal, and General Has Beer Asked For Protection Against

Asked For Protection Against Them.

Lodz, Russia Poland, June 26.—
"Black Friday" in Lodz, surpassed all the horrors of "Red Sunday" in St. Petersburg. While it is not yet pessible to ascertain the exact number of victims estimates place the killed at ever 106, possibly 200, and the wounded 2ve times that number. The trouble here was initiated by the Social Democrats and Jewish Bund, who determined to avenue their comrades killed in the rioting on Wednesday. Thrusday, the feast Corpus Christi, passed off quietly, but during the night workmen attacked the patrois. In this fighting two officers and seven Cossacks were killed. One of the latter was shot by a girl of 13 years.

The city resembles a shambles and the terrible scenes of the last two days will never be wiped from the memory of the Polish people.

The most asrlous phase of the fighting between the military and strikers is at an end, but there are still isolated attacks in the suburbs. At Baluty yesterday morning Cossacks attacked a Jewish family of five persons who were driving in a cab to the railway station and shot and killed all, including the cabman: At Pabjanice, near Lodz, workmen attacked two police men and shot and killed one and wounded the other.

There is general exodus from Lodz. Twelve thousand persons have already left and all trains are crowded. During the disturbances 35 Government ilquor stores were destroyed by the mob, who appropriated all the cash and stamps found on the premises which they added to the funds of the Socialist party. The workmen in all the factories will strike to day.

Some prominent citizens this morning telegraphed Gen. Shunslow, commanding the troops here, asking for protection against the brutality of the soldiers, especially the Cossacks, who in one instance killed and robbed the

protection against the brutality of the soldiers, especially the Cossacks, who in one instance killed and robbed the servant of a millionaire named Rosenblatt, who was carrying \$5,000 to the bank. The general promised to punish the offenders, but said he required witnesses of the occurrence to testify against the Cossacks.

Altogether there are 10 regiments encamped in Lodz. The fighting spirit of the people is fully aroused. They have tasted blood and want more. Certainly the revolutionary spirit is abroad, and it remains to be seen whether military measures will have the same effect as they previously did. Yesterday at Bainty, a suburb of Lodz, four Cossacks were killed and 18 wounded by a bomb which was threat volleys are still fired by police or gendarmes in response to shots from houses. The soldiers are showing what appears to be wanton truelty. Late yesterday afternoon they shot and killed two women a mother and her daughter.

An official report says that the number of casualties was largely increased by the neglect of persons to remain indoors and who insisted on looking out of doors and windows when volleys were being fired by soldiers or rioters. Residents of the city say they received no orders to remain indoors. Shooting was renewed last evening. Cossacks are robbling the dead of lewels and money. ALL WORK TO CEASE IN WARSAW

Protest of the Workers Against the Massacres At Lodz.

Warsaw, June 26.—The proclama-tion issued Baturday by the Social Democratic party of Poland and Lit-tuania, calling out workmen as a pro-test against the Lodz massacre, de-Democratic party of Poland and Litthuania, calling out workmen as a protest against the Lodz massacre, declares that in order to show the solidarity of their brethren and to protest
against "the new and incessant crimes
of the Emperor's Government," all
Warsaw must stop work to-day. The
proclamation orders that not a single
factory or workshop shall be operated
and that offices, shops, restaurants
and coffee-houses must close and all
traffic must cease. It says that the
red flag, the flag of the workingmen
must float in the streets of Warsaw
and calls upon all workmen to help
their brothers arrange a general
surfice.

The military is patrolling all the
streets in the factory and Jewish districts. In the suburh of Praga resterday workmen shot and wounded two
policemen. In Ogrodowa street there
was an encounter between gendarmes
and a crowd and shots were fired on
both sides. Three civillans and one
gendarme were wounded. In other
streets processions of workingmen
were dispersed.

Beginning of Bloodshed.
Rioting commenced Saturday night
Gendarmes charged a crowd and infanty patrols fired two volleys. Three

The situation here, with a majority

LLOYD MURDER CASE.

Evidence Concluded and Magistrate Takes a Week to Consider.

Belleville, June 28.—The investigation into the case of Adam Lloyd, the old farmer charged with the murder of his wife, went on again before Magistrate Fint Saturday. Physiolans and neighbors gave the testimony, and then the defence and the Crown Atterney made their addresses.

Mr. Porter, for the defence, claimed that there was only ill-defined suspicion against the prisoner, and he claimed that no man could be committed on suspicion. The Crown had proyed no desire on the part of Lloyd for his wife's death and no motive for his killing her.

Who could have done that? There was no one there, according to Adam Lloyd, but his wife and himself.

HUNGARY ENVIES NORWAY.

SPIRIT OF WAR

France Begins to Feel it Keenly Along the Border.

Paris, June 28.—La Libertie last night began the publication of a series of articles from the frontier, showing the excited state of public feeling and the activity of the military forces, which are alleged to be constantly drilling and undergoing inspection.

The diplomatic situation remains unchanged, as Germany has not yet presented her answer to the French note. Officials say the negotiations are taking the usual normal course without at present any indications of a marked change. It is definitely known that the French Ambassador to Germany was cerdially received by Chancellor Von Buelow on Friday. This is considered to be a most reasuring symptom of Germany's conciliatory intentions.

FISHING SCHOONER SUNK.

Norwegian Steamer Sverre Rune Dewn the Columbia Off Low Point Halifax, June 26.—The Norwegian steamer Sverre, outward bound from Sydney, with a cargo of coal to Montreal, ran down and sank the Gloucester fishing schooner Columbia, inward bound to Sydney, at 2 o'clock yesterday morning, two miles off Low Point light station. The captain and four of the crew were on deck and fourteen

the crew were on deck and fourteen men were below asleep.

Two of the sallers went into the rigging and jumped on the deck of the steamer and threw ropes to other men who were now scrambling for life as the vessel was sinking rapidly.

The Columbia had 200,000 pounds of cod on board.

Returns to 18 Hour Schedule.

New York, June 26.—The following announcement was made yesterday by president W. H. Newman of the New York Central Railroad: An investigation has shown conclusively that the accident was not caused by the speed of the train; it is now decided unnecessary to longer continue the slower schedule of the Twentieth Centucy train. Its schedule of 18 hours between New York and Chicago will be resumed Monday, the 26th.
