and pour sufficient boiling water over the acid so as to cover the hat completely. Then immerse is and
hold it down with a stick for five minutes, when you should take it out and dry it in the sunshine, or else before a fire. Next prepare some parchment size of white gue, meting either in a hot-water
bath, and brush it with a broad flat paint brush orer the inside of the hat to stiffen the straw.
