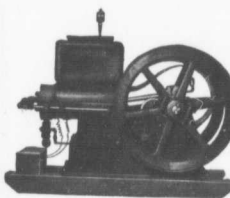

AYRSHIRES AT EXPERIMENTAL FARMS AND COLLEGES

Are the Ayrshire herds in connection with our government institutions as good as they should be. W. F. Stephen, secretary of the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders' Association, evidently thinks not. Read some of the remarks at the last annual meeting of his association. He said:

"During the past year I have inspected the herds at the various Agricultural Colleges, Experimental Farms and stations, except at the Truro Agricultural College. Only at Macdonald College, St. Anne de Bellevue, and at the Experimental Station at Clearhurst, Alta., have they high-class Ayrshires. Those kept at Truelph, Winnipeg and Saskatoon Agricultural Colleges are a very ordinary lot and better Ayrshires can be seen in many of the stables of our breeders. In the stables of the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa, there should be a better and more typical herd. These institutions should have the best as their work is educational, and many will judge of our breed from what they see at these institutions."
