

Mr. Lines may truly be rated as one of the farming magnates of the West.

Rudolph Misch, the man who mysterously disappeared from his home here, and for whose capture \$50 reward was paid, was taken from the Walkerton jail last week and conveyed to the London Asylum, where he will undergo treatment for insanity. The unfortunate man was considerably emaciated by the long exposure he endured in the swamps, previous to his discovery and capture. As his disappearing tendencies caused more alarm to his friends than jeopardy to the neighborhood, he is construed as being a harmless rather than a dangerous subject. There is consequently good reason to believe that with proper care and treatment he may be restored to the full possession of his mental powers again.

The action was for slander of a most cruel and despicable kind, and the what council termed him "a blackguard." The lady plaintiff, gave her evidence in a clear and convincing style, and had a most modest demeanor. She was but 27 years of age, and the defendant had frequently called at her home. He had wished to marry her, but she had refus-

ed. He had never taken any improper liberties with her, and the criminal intimacy which he had boasted of and which vile slander formed the basis of the action, the handsome witness denied with flashing eyes. Thomas Wallace, a witness for the plaintiff, told of the slanderous statements made to him by the defendant concerning the lady plaintiff, and that the further shocking allegation had been made against the brother and sister, plaintiffs in the action in which the grossest immorality was charged. The defendant went into the box and denied that the wrongful meaning suggested could be imputed to his words. He had been willing before action to sign abject apology and give a bond not to slander the plaintiffs again, signed by his father, but he would not pay a modest bill amounting to \$20 for papers drawn by the plaintiff,s solicitor, Mr. A. G. Campbell of Harriston. In

cross examination Mr. Nichol Jeffray, of Guelph, literally excoriated the witness, and the crowded court room could hardly conceal the contempt the craven defendant inspired. Mr. Anson Spotton, of Harriston, for the defendant, attempted to draw an innocent inference from his client, whom the Judge afterwards characterized as illiterate and ignorant. The address of Mr. Jeffray was a brilliant effort, and the defendant winced under the bitter invectives and fierce eloquence of the plaintiff's coun-

The Judge charged the jury briefly, and pointed out the value of one's reputation, especially a woman's and quoted with approval and significance Shakespear's immortal lines:

"Good name in man and woman Is the immediate jewel of their souls, Who steals my purse steals trash, Tis something, nothing,

But he that filches from me my good Robs me of that which not enriches him.

And makes me poor indeed." The jury retired at 6.45 p. m., and a verdict of \$3,000 was rendered. The Judge awarded full High Court costs


