Shooting Affray at Wingham

Wingham, Feb. 25 — Ex-Councillor  
Wm Patterson, well-known jeweller, is  
in jail, and Albert Lutitt, butcher, is in  
Wingham Hospital with a dangerous  
bullet wound in his abdomen as the re-  
sult of a shooting affray which occurred  
in the Patterson residence.

All the circumstances in connection  
with the affair are not known, but the  
statement is made by Patterson that he

The exact nature of the charge to be

condition of Lutitt. Crown Attorney  
Seager of Goderich has been informed

preliminary hearing.

terson home. Upon investigation he  
could hear the voices of two men in a  
violent quarrel. He found the front

Alarmed, the watchman went to the  
home of Chief Allen for aid and returned  
with him to the Patterson home. They  
effected an entrance and found Pat-  
terson and Lutitt lying on the floor down-  
stairs. Lutitt had a bullet wound in his  
abdomen, and a mark on the floor show-  
ing the course of the second bullet. The  
gun was lying nearby. Doctors Calder  
and Redmond were called and attended to  
Lutitt's injury, and then had him re-  
moved to the hospital.

The two men are well known mer-  
chants of the town and have been on  
friendly terms for years. A motive for
