

British Isles Imports \$1,375, 000,000 Worth of Foodstuffs Each Year.

LONDON, July 7—The provision-ing of the British Isle is one of the marvels of the world. The foreign produce imported is by far the largest item in the national food bill. It imported from practically every ountry on the globe and totals \$1,-75,000,000 a year, rather less than a hird of which is credited to British versea possessions.

The largest individual contribution \$175,000,000 worth of food, comes from Argentina. Of other countries outside of Europe the United States comes next, with about \$10,000,000 less, followed by India, with \$125,000,-000; Canada with \$100,000,000; Australia, with \$70,000,000; New Zealand with \$50,000,000 and so on through a list of eighty or ninety separate countries down to Afghanistan's modest contribution of \$3,180 worth of ried raisens.
