NEWS OF NORFOLK
1917 Tax Rate to be Fixed at Meeting of Simcoe Council Tonight
A JUMP IS EXPECTED
 New Union School Section Question Coming Before County Council
OTHER SIMCOE NEWS
Examination Results in Academy and College of Music

Simcoe, June 3.—From Our Own Correspondent.—The funeral of the late John H. Goodland, was held at St. John's cemetery, Woodhouse, at the rate for 1917. The traffic moved away shortly after eleven o'clock. The bearers were all former neighbors and life long associates, who, as it were came up to carry home the remains of one whom they missed for some six years since when the deceased left there for Simcoe. They were Wm. Colley, George Dixon, Wm. Laine, Colin McCullidge, Wm. Stamp and F. W. Smith. The many floral tributes and other expressions of concern by people of all ranks went to show, that as one said, "Sunshine always came with him, when he came down town."

Town Council Tonight
 There is every indication of a long session of council to-night. The committee on alterations at the market will have plans and specifications ready to submit to the council. The finance committee will present the estimates and announce the rate for 1917. The traffic by-law will probably get its final reading.

There is a general impression abroad that the rate is almost sure to take a jump of at least two mills. Lower hotel assessment, loss of the Litho Plant \$44,860, additional debentures to take care of, and none of the old ones terminating, coupled with the high cost of teams, feed and wages are factors, consideration of which go to reconcile the objectionable and concrete rate payer to his lot. On top of this, the Board of Education has asked for \$1,360 more this year than last, which is in itself slightly more than has been asked for in the past.

It will be understood then that fines for infractions of town by-laws are at present very acceptable in the treasury.

Arrangements for collecting the mill tax will probably be made at the June meeting. It is estimated that there are at least 100 liable for this tax.

The question of the re-division of the town into seven instead of five wards to comply with the statute may be necessary.

County Council Meets Tomorrow
 The June meeting of the County Council, of Norfolk will begin tomorrow at 2 p.m. Besides ordinary routine, the question of a swing bridge at Port Dover, and the matter of the new union school section at Simcoe are among the special matters to be dealt with.

It is highly probable that the council will give little time to the school matter. There was no difference of opinion among the arbitrators in the finding handed out. A month was given for the entry of appeal before the award was made and no appeal was entered. Subsequently some of those who signed the appeal to the county council, present there are but eleven effective appellants, against forty-two on the counter memorial. The move against the new section is quite evidently made by those who desire to keep down the tax regardless of the merits of the case, and it now looks as if the council will let matters stand. We have been able to obtain an almost complete list of the names of those who desire the council to offset the award:

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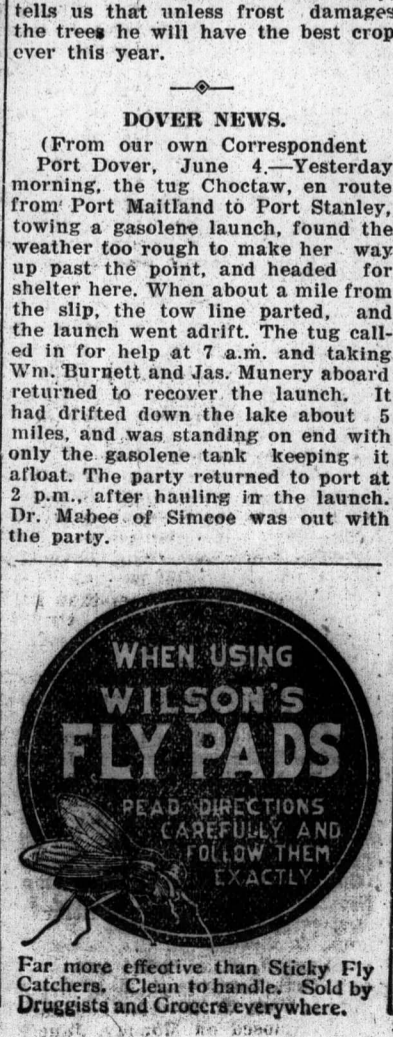
DOVER NEWS.
