Simeoe, April 1—(From Our Own Correspondent).—At six o'clock Saturday evening Guy E. Marston, C.E. county engineer and superintendent of good roads, received word that two hours previously Roger Chrysler, for 23 years treasurer for Norfolk, had passed away. 
