Mormon Missionaries Must Vamoose

Russian Grand Duchy Will Not Stand for Brigham Young's Ideas.

PASSENGER WRECKED

Defective Rail Causes a Bad Accident

Engine, Express and Baggage Car Are Thrown Into a Ditch.

Special to the Daily Nugget. Kansas City, April 24.—Passenger train No. 103 of the San Francisco system which left Kansas City for Memphis and Birmingham was partially wrecked by a defective rail. The engine, baggage, express and mail cars went into a ditch and were badly damaged. The engineer and fireman and one postal clerk were killed, a mail clerk and one passenger were seriously hurt. Perhaps a dozen passengers were slightly injured.

LOOK INTO SALMON FISHING

United States Will Send Well Equipped Expedition Into Alaskan Waters—Secure Reports on Condition Found to Exist—Will Visit Canneries.

Special to the Daily Nugget. Washington, April 24.—The United States government has completed plans for a thorough investigation of the salmon fishery industry of Alaska. Orders have been issued and the largest expedition ever sent out by the fish commissioners will soon depart for Alaskan waters. Some of the best known scientists of the country are among those who will aid the proposed investigation.

Nova Scotia's Members. Halifax, April 5.—In the house of assembly yesterday E. M. Macdonald of Pictou brought up the question of the reduction of Nova Scotia's representation in the house of commons, proposed by the redistribution bill, and argued that the word Canada in the British North America act referred to the original provinces of the federation and that therefore their representation would be subject to change.

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SENSATION CREATED

By Mysterious Disappearance of Yacht

Bridal Party Fail to Arrive at Destination—Foul Play Feared.

It had aboard M. and Mme D'Esmeraud, a sister of the latter M'la Marguerite Gourio de Refuge, and two sailors, Lafont and Bertin. The D'Esmerauds were on their wedding tour. On April 7th the party embarked, Mme D'Esmeraud carrying several jewels and her husband having several thousand francs. The party should have reached Nice the same day. As the weather has been magnificent no reason can be assigned for the disappearance of the vessel.
