## Many Maritime Harvesters

The crowd from the Maritime Provinces leaving by the I.C.R. and C.P.R. harvest excursions on Saturday exceeded expectations as to numbers, and so large was the number by the I.C.R. that 100 could not be accommodated on the two excursion trains. One of them of seventeen cars, had to be forwarded by the Maritime Express later to Montreal where they connected with one of the Grand Trunk excursion trains. There were about 700 from P. E. Island alone and about 500 from Cape Breton. The C.P.R. carried about 400 and the total from the Maritime Provinces must have been at least 1,800. F. L. Duggan of the I.C.R. offices at Moncton, went to Montreal on the train carrying the Islanders and J. H. Corcoran, of the Grand Trunk went on the other I.C.R. train, while L. W. Lindsay, went forward to St. John on the C. P. R. train.

## Y.M.C.A. AT KENTVILLE

The Y.M.C.A. rooms which have been opened at Kentville in conjunction with the Aldershot Y.M.C.A. are now in charge of Mr. H. H. Titus of St. Martins, N.B., a regular staff secretary employed for the work. These rooms which are located in the Pastime Theatre building are for the convenience of the soldiers when they are in town and afford opportunity for reading, writing, playing pool or billiards, etc.

An open air service will be held each Sunday evening at 8.15 o'clock while weather permit. These services which will be held on the Y.M.C.A. grounds, Main Street, will consist of songs and an address by some prominent man. Special features such as socials or entertainments will be arranged for from time to time. The patronage and co-operation of the citizens of Kentville is asked for in order that the Y.M.C.A. program may be carried through successfully.

It is expected that in cooperation with the Red Cross Society of Kentville assisted by other Red Cross Societies and civilians of the County that entertainment and refreshments will be served the several battalions stationed at Aldershot on Thursday the 24th instant at the Y.M.C.A. grounds, Main Street.

The programme as arranged for next Sunday evening will consist of an address by Captain Chaplain Tupper of the 193rd Battalion. A cornet solo by Mrs. Robblee. Band instruments will assist in the music.
