KINDERGARTENS AND CULTURE.

The International Kindergarten Union, which is celebrating its silver jubilee in Chicago, does not intend to discard the name "kindergarten" as has been suggested, because of its German origin and associations. Why should the idea ever have been seriously entertained. There is no good substitute name and the kindergarten scheme of instruction is about as un-Prussian as anything in education. In fact, the Prussian Government in 1855 officially announced that schools founded on Froebel's principles could not be "allowed."

Not everything with a German name is bad, and kindergarten now adays are more American than German. Quite another matter is the decision of the Cornell University authorities to devote to a broader purpose the \$100,000 endowment given to the university by Jacob H. Schiff in 1912 "to promote studies in German Culture." At the donor's suggestion the fund will be applied to the study of human civilization, beginning with lectures on the civilization of France.

This is the repudiation of Prussian principles and ideals which all Americans will endorse. The civilized world knows all it wants to know of culture; it cannot know too much of the true culture which is the antidote of the poisonous, and France is an excellent fountainhead to which to go. In this case it is not a mere question of changing a German name harmless in itself but of eradicating a German taint.

WELL KNOWN CITIZEN OF AMHERST DIES.

Mr. John McLeod, died in Amherst suddenly on the 28th. He had been ill but a short time. He was born in Pictou 64 years ago. He was an expert molder by trade and held important positions in Yarmouth, Kentville, and Hantsport, going from the latter place to the Robb Engineering Company, 24 years ago, during which time he has held a most important position until his illness. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Nettie, wife of Col. J. L. Kelton, of the 85th Nova Scotia Highlanders; three brothers, Roderick of Halifax; George of Brunswick, Maine and Hugh of Hatfield, Mass., and one sister, Mrs. Alex. Grantmyer, Sydney.

A memorial to the late Archdeacon Martell in the form of a Lectureship or chair of Pastoral Theology at King's College will be established; and brass memorials will also be erected in Christ Church, Windsor and at Maitland.
