### AN INCONSISTENT ORGAN

The Globe is screaming  
loudly because it claims that  
the people of the Northwest have not  
enough representatives in the House.  
Well, that readjustment will  
not come shortly, when a redistri-  
bution of seats is made on the basis  
of the last census.  
While the Globe is just about  
as consistent in this matter as it is  
with reference to most others.  
Take the British House of Com-  
mons as a sample.  
This is how the seats work out  
in that parliament:  
Electors Seats  
England and Wales 6,221,722 465  
Scotland 4,929,251 72  
Ireland 4,371,163 82  
It will thus be seen that Ireland  
is grossly over-represented as com-  
pared with the others.  
Would the Globe ever kick about that?  
Would the Liberal Government in the  
United Kingdom make the slightest move  
towards readjustment?  
Is it not to argue that the dis-  
proportion is right, because it isn't, but  
that such exists.  
If the leading Grit organ take a  
good illustration.  
Mr. Ross, backed by the Globe,  
attempting to hang onto power in  
the constituency unpunished for  
his pro-Conservative attitude.  
The issue did the Toronto  
protest against that out-  
rage.

### GOING FOR LAURIER.

Mr. Bennett, the brilliant young  
member for Calgary, gave Sir Wil-  
fred Laurier a very unpleasant time  
at yesterday's caucus.  
He showed that the Canada ex-  
posed once said that Britain and  
Canada must part and that on another  
point at Quebec he declared that  
Canada would become independent  
of the Old Land just as "the ripe  
apple drops from the parent tree."  
He challenged Sir Wilfrid to say  
whether he still held such views and  
a white plumed knight sat as  
the answer.  
The truth is that no man in pub-  
lic life has ever had a more contra-  
dictory career than Sir Wilfrid. He  
is all for free trade "as they  
do it in England." He was for  
high expenditures and promptly  
cut when the moment he had a  
chance he was—well it is impos-  
sible to touch him at any stage of  
his career without unearthing his  
inconsistent policy.

### THE DISPUTES DURING 1912.

The important feature of the current  
feature of the current  
the Labor Gazette, is a com-  
pact statement dealing with  
disputes in existence in Canada  
for the year 1912. The total num-  
ber of strikes and lockouts during the  
year was 159. The prevailing trade  
disputes considerably increased the  
number for higher wages. It is  
not of note however, that a great  
portion of the disputes of 1912  
of comparatively small import-  
ance, no less than 111 of the number  
commenced during the year af-  
fecting less than 300 employees, while  
only 48 were altogether 40,511 em-  
ployed were involved in trade disputes. A  
marked decrease was seen in the  
number of employees. The num-  
ber of working days lost in 1912 was  
nearly 1,099,208, which is  
slightly more than one-half the  
number lost during 1911. In this con-  
nection it will be noticed from the  
fact that two disputes of railway  
and one of garment workers  
accounted for the ces-  
sation of work on the part of 13,500  
employees and for the loss of 584,500  
working days.  
The important feature of the 1912  
report was the fact that fifty-two  
disputes involved workers in the  
building trades. The majority of these  
were strikes pending the arrangement  
of new schedules and were of com-  
paratively short duration. Sixty-  
six disputes occurred in Ontario, 24  
in Quebec, sixteen in Saskatchewan  
thirteen in Alberta, ten in British  
Columbia, seven in Manitoba, six in  
New Brunswick and five in Nova

Brantford, and that such increase in  
salaries be made, if necessary, as to  
command the best possible men."

building, Monday, a.m. Feb.  
25th. A deputation was appointed  
to lay the resolution before the  
Board of Police Commissioners at  
their meeting on Thursday next.  
The representatives of the Associ-  
ated Brotherhoods met in the Y.M.C.A.  
at 8 p.m. last evening, and unanimously  
passed the following resolutions:  
Resolved, — That we have read  
the report of the chief of police with  
much satisfaction, and congratulate  
him on being able to present such a  
favorable statement of police admin-  
istration during the past year.  
We are strongly of the opinion  
that the recommendation of the chief  
for the appointment of more men  
should be acted upon by the board  
of police commissioners, as we be-  
lieve the strength of the force is not  
equal to the claims made upon it.  
We are further of the opinion that  
if the efficiency of the force is to be  
maintained, some advance must be  
made in salaries paid.  
Be it further resolved, that this re-  
solution be presented to the Board  
of Police Commissioners on Thurs-  
day afternoon next, by a committee  
of this association of Brotherhoods.

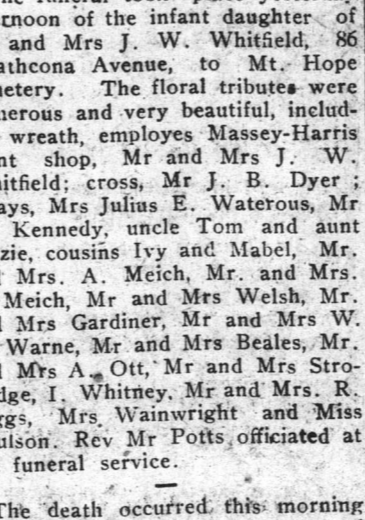
### Conservatives of Grandview Form a Strong Organization
