CELEBRATION FOR CHATHAM

Veteran Firemen Will Hold
A Big Event Here In
August

Parades And Athletic
Games Will Be Held—
Meeting Tonight

Chatham is still to have a celebration this year, in spite of the fact that the 24th of May went by unnoticed, and that the first of July is likely to be created in the same manner.

The Maple City's big celebration will come this year in August, and it will be under the management of the Veteran Firemen—at least this is the present intention. There will be a meeting of the Veteran Firemen in the Fire Hall to-night, when the matter of a big re-union and public celebration will be discussed.

It is the intention to make a big day of it, with parades, sports and athletic games. It will be something new for Chatham, and it will be quite popular. The men have come to the rescue in the matter of a celebration, and they will receive every encouragement from the citizens.

There are a number of Veterans in the surrounding towns—Dresden, Blenheim, Ridgeway, Tilbury and Wallaceburg—and a big delegation is expected from Detroit.

The meeting to-night should be largely attended, for it is hoped that the scheme will be pushed through to a successful issue.

KILLED TWO DETECTIVES

Lodz, Russian Poland, June 5.—Two detectives were killed and two others and three other persons were wounded in a street here yesterday by a bomb thrown at the police officials by terrorists.

A patrol of infantry, attracted by the explosion, appeared on the scene soon afterwards, and opened fire on the crowd, wounding 13 persons. Thirty arrests were made in connection with the affair.

WON'T STAND FOR CRUELTY.

Two of Premier Stolypin's Temporary Laws Rejected By Duma.

St. Petersburg, June 5.—The Lower House of Parliament yesterday rejected two more of Premier Stolypin's temporary laws, one providing for increased punishment and trial exclusively before military and naval courts martial of persons charged with conducting a revolutionary propaganda among the troops or sailors, and the other authorizing the police to fetter political prisoners.

M. M. Dzharapikze, Dzhugholi and Kandaliaki, Social Democratic members of Parliament who participated in the London Congress, reappeared in the Lower House yesterday. They have constantly been shadowed by detectives since landing at Helsinki, Finland, and were searched on arrival in St. Petersburg, despite their strong protests, the officers informing them that they acted under the personal order of the prefect of police.

LUMBER CAMPS CLOSE.

Two Thousand Men Affected With Big Loss of Salaries.

Vancouver, B.C., June 5.—At a largely-attended meeting of the British Columbia Loggers' Association Monday, it was decided to close down the logging camps, the shut-down to take effect June 20 and last indefinitely.

It will affect sixty-nine camps, having a total output of 34,250,000 feet per month. The action was taken on account of the small demand, high wages and the increased cost of supplies. It will throw out of employment 2,000 men, \$125,000 to \$175,000 per month. The camps will start again whenever the market warrants it.

EDNA MAY MARRIED.

Becomes Bride of Oscar Lewisohn of New York.

London, June 5.—Edna May, the American actress, was married yesterday morning at the Registry Office at Windsor to Oscar Lewisohn, son of Adolph Lewisohn, of New York, in the presence of a few relatives and intimate friends. The honeymoon will be spent in a motoring tour on the continent.

Presbyterians to Meet.

Montreal, June 5.—To-morrow evening, in Erskine Church, this city, the supreme court of Canadian Presbyterianism begins its annual session. The first sederunt will be devoted to public worship, conducted by the moderator, Dr. Alexander Falconer of Picton, N.S.

The assembly is then formally constituted, and a new presiding officer elected. For ten days the well-organized body will grapple with the business of a great Canadian church.

Farmers' Convention.

Ottawa, June 5.—A farmers' convention is to be held here on June 12, for the purpose of gathering the ideas of Eastern Ontario farmers on the Assessment Act.

The farmers allege that improvements of property mean increased taxes and that only land should be taxed, not farm buildings and lands, as well as assessing them in summer alone.

These are points that will be discussed.

DYING MAN DIRECTS DOCTOR.

With His Skull Fractured Tells How to Get Him Out.

New York, June 5.—Terribly crushed under a car and his body tied up in the motor underneath, Timothy Walsh of Boston road, and 180th street yesterday afternoon directed the efforts of Dr. Bickelhaupt of Fordham Hospital to extricate him.

His skull was fractured, both legs severed and one eye burned out, and he gave directions to the surgeon who crept in under the car after it had been jacked up, as to the easiest way to dislodge his maimed body.

Walsh had dumped a load of cement at Bryant street and West Farms road, and was directly in the path of a southbound West Farms car. Before it could be stopped, Walsh was knocked under the wheels and wedged in about the motor box. He will probably die.

MEN BLOWN TO PIECES.

Powder Car Explodes Killing Five Persons Who Were Looking On.

Kankakee, Ill., June 5.—At least five persons are dead as the result of an explosion of a carload of giant powder on the Chicago, Indiana & Southern Railroad at Kankakee, Ill., 20 miles west of here, yesterday morning. The car, loaded with matches, caught fire, and a crowd gathered. It is supposed that the burning matches set off the powder in the adjoining cars.

The fragments of the dead were torn to fragments. The explosion was felt for twenty miles, and many windows were broken.

TWO RAILWAY WRECKS.

Three Missing in One—Naphtha Car Explodes.

Worcester, Mass., June 5.—A collision of a through freight and switcher on New Haven and Hartford near Southgate street, occurred at 12:15 p. m. The freight train, on fire, and the freight car, engineer and a trainman are missing.

Erie, Pa., June 5.—A freight train on the Nickel Plate Railroad was wrecked at Harbor Creek, six miles east of here, shortly after midnight. The wreck took place, and three cars of naphtha were reported to have exploded. Details are meagre.

Boy's Awful Condition.

Montreal, June 5.—The police yesterday arrested a 15-year-old French-Canadian boy named Henri Tremblay, on a charge of stealing stamps, and money. He was found to be literally rotting away from disease and vermin, his extremities and body were in an unprecedented state of filth.

Driven from a motherless home by the alleged cruelty of his father, the boy took refuge in a stable, where he spent last winter suffering incredible hardships.
