Report of Sanitary Inspector.

To the Mayor and Members of the Wolfville Town Council: GENTLEMEN,—During the year now ended the health of the inhabitants of this town has been good, the mortality small and mostly confined to the aged, while epidemic diseases have been present in the smallest extent. During the early spring diphtheritis was brought in from outside, made its appearance in one family, proving fatal to three children; and in August a solitary case of diphtheritis appeared in another family. Prompt sanitary measures prevented the disease from spreading or appearing elsewhere. The regulations adopted by the Board of Health, requiring all cases of epidemic contagious diseases such as diphtheritis, scarlet fever, small pox, etc., to be reported by householders and physicians under penalty of a fine, will do much towards preventing such diseases becoming prevalent. The lack of any system of drainage is very noticeable, and it is undoubtedly necessary that the refuse from sinks and bath-rooms should be cared for and rendered innocuous. As a large majority of the electors of this town have expressed themselves opposed to incurring the expense of a system of sewerage, may not the provision of a tank wagon and pump for removing the contents of cess-pools be considered as a fairer device on the Council?

At the request of the Board of Health the Creamery Co. has laid down a large tile drain from the Creamery to the Creek, with the result that the open drainage considered a nuisance by families in that neighborhood now no longer exists.

There are a number of cases of measles in town.

Monday's storm is said to have been the worst for twenty-five years.

A hockey match is to be played in Aberdeen rink on Saturday evening between the Kentville team and the Victorians of this town. This will be the first meeting of the teams and an exciting game may be expected.

Instead of the usual preaching service in the Baptist church, Wolfville, a service of song and recitation on the "Life of Christ" will be given by the Sunday School, Sunday evening, Feb. 6th, beginning at 7 o'clock. Silver collection.

The lecture in the hall at Fort Williams this evening will be well attended. The lecturer, Rev. J. M. Fisher, is an eloquent and pleasing speaker and his subject, "Jan MacLaren," should be a most popular one. We bespeak a full house for the lecture.

On Monday evening next Rev. George J. Bond, of Halifax, is to lecture in the Methodist church, in town, on the subject "Never Say Die." The speaker is well known as an entertaining lecturer and we have no doubt but that a large audience will greet him here.

An interesting game of hockey was played at the rink on Thursday evening of last week, between the Victorians of this town and a team from Windsor, resulting in a victory for the home team with a score of 4-1. The Windsor players put up a good game considering that they have had no place for practice this winter.

The Y. P. S. C. E. in connection with Chalmers' Church, Lower Horton, is to give a concert on Tuesday evening next which promises to be a very enjoyable affair. Among those who will take part will be Rev. Mr. Macdonald and Miss Macdonald, Mr. Robson, Miss Lina Burgess, of Wolfville, and Prof. Rogers and Miss Patterson, of Acadia Villa.

Wolfville's Hockey Teams.

Mr. EMMETT—I write for the benefit of those whose "town patriotism" has been humbled by reading that the Wolfville hockey team was lately defeated by the Canning team. The newspaper reporters in our town do not, I fear, take much trouble to learn the particulars of such an insignificant affair as hockey and so the following facts are, I think, very much in order.

The hockey season opened with the organization of two clubs, the Victorians and the Tigers. On Jan. 22nd the Tigers (not the Wolfville team) had a match with Canning in which the latter were victorious. The Tigers thereupon withdrew from existence, leaving behind them a record which is not likely to be added to this winter at least, for indeed in any future winters.

The Victoria club, while not having the advantage of "imported tricks," has stuck to work and is in a very prosperous condition. This club meets for practice at the rink every Tuesday night, and has now two good teams ready for service.

On the evening that witnessed the discomfiture of the Tigers, the Canning captain was approached by a Victoria man with a view to getting a match on. The proposition was to be hospitable when the Canning man delivered himself thus: "Say, do you fellows think I'm a fool? I made a few enquiries before consenting to play these here Tigers, I did, and I know all about you fellows."

In a match with Windsor on Thursday, the 27th, the Victorians came off conquerors, as you know, by the score of 6 to 1.

Matches are being arranged with Annapolis, and correspondence commenced with St. John and Halifax teams, while the Junior team of the Victorians is expected to play Kentville (Wolfville) on Thursday, Feb. 5th.
