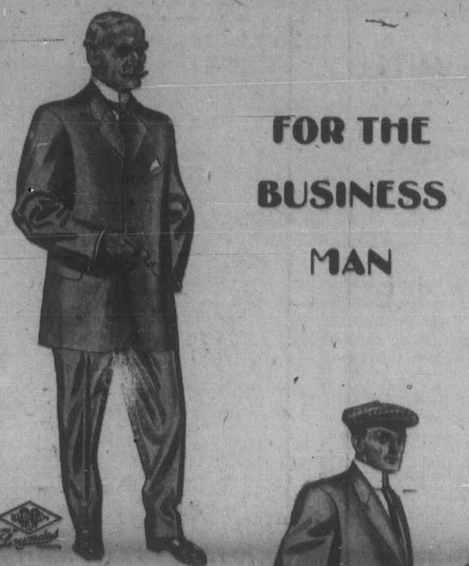

The prospect of having an abattoir built across the Cornwallis river must be very gratifying to the people of this vicinity. Now that Mr. Wickwire and his friends are working in favor of the project we may reasonably expect it to be constructed. We are indeed very fortunate in having a representative so wide awake and progressive as Mr. Wickwire. Kings county has never had much for public works, and is certainly deserving of something. I wish to draw the attention of Mr. Wickwire and his friends to some other matters worthy of their notice. What a splendid thing it would be to dredge the Gasperau river, say as far as White Rock Mills, and build a few wharves at suitable places along the river. The Gasperau valley is one of the most fertile parts of Kings county. Now that free trade is practically assured with the United States, a very large trade in apples, potatoes and other farm products could be carried on direct with Boston and New York. If the improvements indicated were made, The Black River might also be made navigable as far as the Falls for the benefit of picnic parties. Another thing which deserves more than a passing notice is the need of better communication with Boute Island. A bridge or subway at the 'Guzzle' would be a boon to a large number of people. I sincerely trust that Mr. Wickwire will give these matters his most earnest consideration. AN ADMIRER.

Employers should act immediately. Last year many applications were received too late in the season for procuring satisfactory help. Rev. Dr. Crowell, field agent for the Maritime Baptist Minister's Annuity Endowment, preached at the Wolfville Baptist church Sunday morning in the interest of that Fund.
